Uxbridge Considers New Road Supt.

At the inaugural meeting of Uxbridge Township Council when all members were present, having been returned by acclamation, the following committees were struck for the year: Finance—Rae, Middleton & Johnson; Road and Bridge, Reeve and Council. Relief, Beach, Rae and Middleton, Contingent, Johnson, Beach & Rae. Middleton, Rae, R. E. Ashenhurst and Edgar Johnson were appointed to the Goodwood, Community Park Board for 1940, and R. E. Darling, J. F. Reid, J. E. Kidd, John Ashenhurst and Mrs. J. E. Wagg, appointed for the years 1940-41. Beach-Middleton moved that 1,000 ft. snowfence be purchased and that 500 feet be put on road 2, between Altona and Glasgow. As a dog belonging to a resident of Reach Twp., had been killing sheep in Uxbridge, the clerk was instructed to write the owner to have same killed forthwith or proceedings would be taken. A by-law was given its several readings authorizing the Reeve and Treas. to borrow money from the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Stouffville as necessary. A by-law was also passed authorizing the expenditure of \$9,500 on the Roads in the Township of Uxbridge for year 1940. Appointment was made by by-law, naming Mr. Russel Feasby, Fred Johnston, auditors for 1940; Ernest Morgason, Members of the Board of Health; W. G. Cassie, weed inspector, and Mr. Cecil Wallace, School Attendance Officer. A resolution was sponsored by councillors Beach and Rae, that a new Road Superintendent be appointed in the name of Mr. Walter Brown, and demanding the yeas and nays on same. After considerable discussion the question was demanded, and the Clerk taking the yeas and nays resulting as follows, yeas Beach and Rae, nays Middleton Ashenhurst and Johnson.
