BRITAIN BUYS BACON HELPS CANADIAN TRADE

L. W. Pearsall, secretary-manager of the Dominion bacon board, last week brought to the agriculture committee of the Ontario legislature details of the Anglo-Canadian agreement for shipment of Canadian pork products to Great Britain.

Mr. Pearsall explained that on Dec. 15, the British ministry asked for weekly shipments of 40,000 hundredweight of Wiltshire hams and 35 per cent other cuts, he said.

The British government now is taking 50,000 hundredweight weekly, said Mr. Pearsall. The shipments run 65 per cent. Wiltshire sides and 35 per cent. other cuts, he said.

"The first duty of the bacon board," he stated, "is to ensure a full supply of bacon. We should also ensure that the producer gets a full share of the benefits."

There is going to be a "substantial increase" in hog raising Mr. Pearsall predicted, adding that "we hope to take some of the mystery out of this hog business, and place it somewhat in the same position as wheat. The western wheat grower knows pretty well what he's going to get for his wheat."

Canada has a grand opportunity to capture the British bacon market and retain it, according to Kenneth Morrison, of the first Ontario Co-operative Packers, Barrie. He said it is necessary for hog producers and packers to overcome British prejudice against Canadian bacon, a hang-over from the last war, when "quality didn't mean anything" to shippers.

"It was not only Canadian bacon that ruined our reputation in the last war," he said. "There was an American bacon, too. To the Englishman it was all American, he didn't distinguish between it."

FIND SOIL ON 664 FARMS LACKING IN CHEMICALS

Of the 664 farms in York County, (many of which are in Markham and Whitchurch townships,) that submitted their soil samples last fall for examination, showed that 80 per cent of them are lacking in phosphate, and 50 per cent are short of potash. This information was placed before the York County council last week by the Agricultural Committee, and it was realized that a service had been done the farmer. With just the right elements in the soil, maximum crops may be produced. Farmers may be fertilizing with expensive fertilizer which his soil does not require, while not putting in that particular element which the farm needs. This survey of soil told them exactly what is lacking. Council adopted a resolution

The Reeve on the request of members of Council called a special meeting to discuss the matter in the Township Hall at Goodwood, on Monday, Feb'y 5, and with the members all present the matter of opening up the snow roads was given lengthy consideration and discussion, the feeling being that if a certain road was opened up all parts of the Township should be given the same consideration.

It was decided to engage the County Snow Plow at \$2.75 per hour and to get it as soon as possible. A plan of the roads to be opened was given the Road Superintendent to supervise.

The Council then adjourned to meet on regular date of Feb. 10th for general business.

to continue the survey in 1940 and commended Ontario Agricultural College surveyors for the excellent work accomplished. From the 664 farms some 2,700 samples were taken and examined at the college.

"Interim reports showed that most of the samples contained sufficient lime," declared Reeve W. H. Pugsley of Sutton, "while 80 per cent showed a deficiency of phosphates. This is to be expected in a milk producing area."

Plans were discussed to replenish the lands with phosphates and potash, the work to commence within the very near future.

Council also gave approval to a continuance of the potato program begun in 1939. The plan is to provide better potato crops for York County to compete with the maritime potato crop.

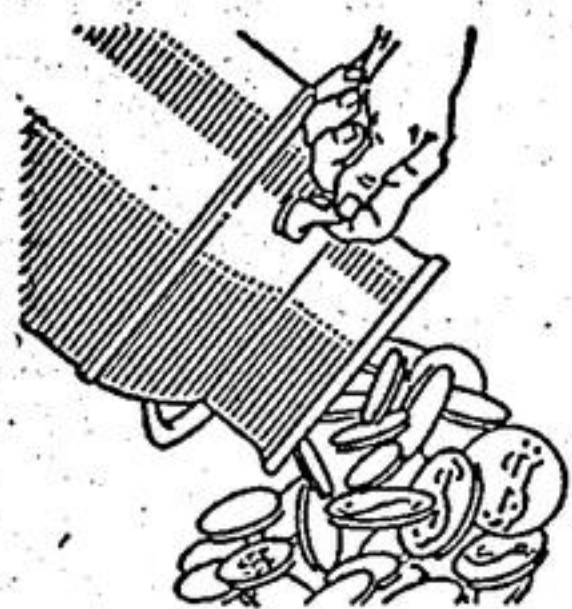
