### Township Tax Sale in Spring

Thirteen properties were listed by the Pickering Township tax collector, as subject to tax sale, at the regular meeting of the Township Council, on Monday. Total arrears of taxes against these lands is \$1,489.27. Pickering tax arrears have been steadily reduced it was announced, \$3,750 having been collected last year.

A motion was passed to amend the by-law regarding fence bonusing, whereby it would not be necessary for farmers to erect wire fences in place of the rails to entitle them to collect the bonus.

"If more of our rail fences could be removed," stated Councillor Ruddy, "one maintainer plow could handle the snow problem, without any truck plows."

Councillor Heber Downs was strongly opposed to the motion, feeling that council was letting themselves in for considerable unnecessary bonusing. Twenty-five cents a foot is paid for a bonus on the main roads, and fifteen cents on sideroads.

A new agreement was drawn up whereby the Pickering-Markham townline, and the Pickering-Scarboro townline would be apportioned equally for maintenance work, rather than merely having the cost being divided as formerly.

Council approved the regular library grants, which include the libraries of Pickering, Brougham, Claremont, Kinsale and Whitevale.

W. B. Milne placed claim for one sheep injured \$15, and Orville Burton, one sheep \$20. The latter claim was for a valuable ewe of registered stock.

Council decided to call for tenders for a new truck for service in conjunction with the township gravel pit. The municipality has three such trucks in service.

Relief for the month was \$433.92, which is a decrease over the same period of last year.

Road accounts totalled \$220.

Wellman's Corner, near Belleville, where a double murder shocked the whole province last weekend, is the home of relatives of the Wellman family so many years resident of the Glasgow district near Stouffville, but this particular family where tragedy struck, are not related to our Wellman's, we are informed by Mr. Harry Wellman of Glasgow. There are, it appears, a lot of Wellman's in the district, but not all related.

In the murder case police arrested Fred Thain two days after the killing. Thain was a member of the coroner's jury that sat to decide the cause of the couple's deaths.

The investigation concentrated on tracks of a team of horses and a sleigh, and a man's footprints, near the Wellman barn and leading to and from the concession road. Missing grain was the object of a wide search. Thain's farm house and barn

Mrs. Wellman had been shot while sitting in bed writing to her daughter, Dr. Iona Wellman of Chicago. Mr. Wellman was shot while milking in the barn. It was believed the killer stood in a horse stall across the stable to fire the charge.

The bodies were discovered by the mailman, Edward Falconer. Because of the age of the couple, 77 and 75, he had been accustomed to carrying the mail to their house. When he received no reply to his knocks, he investigated, finding the bodies.

Mr. Wellman, police state, had purchased a load of grain four days before, but only one sack was left. There had also been rumors that he had collected on some mortgages, and though investigation revealed he had not done so, it is thought the murderer may have been under the impression there was money in the house.

Police found one tangible clue. That was a spent shell, believed to be from the gun used by the killer, found on the windowsill in Mrs. Wellman's bedroom.
