

while sitting in bed writing to her daughter, Dr. Iona Wellman of Chicago. Mr. Wellman was shot while milking in the barn. It was believed the killer stood in a horse stall across the stable to fire the charge.

The bodies were discovered by the mailman, Edward Falconer. Because of the age of the couple, 77 and 75, he had been accustomed to carrying the mail to their house. When he received no reply to his knocks, he investigated, finding the bodies.

Mr. Wellman, police state, had purchased a load of grain four days before, but only one sack was left. There had also been rumors that he had collected on some mortgages, and though investigation revealed he had not done so, it is thought the murderer may have been under the impression there was money in the house.

Police found one tangible clue. That was a spent shell, believed to be from the gun used by the Mr. killer, found on the windowsill in Mrs. Wellman's bedroom.
