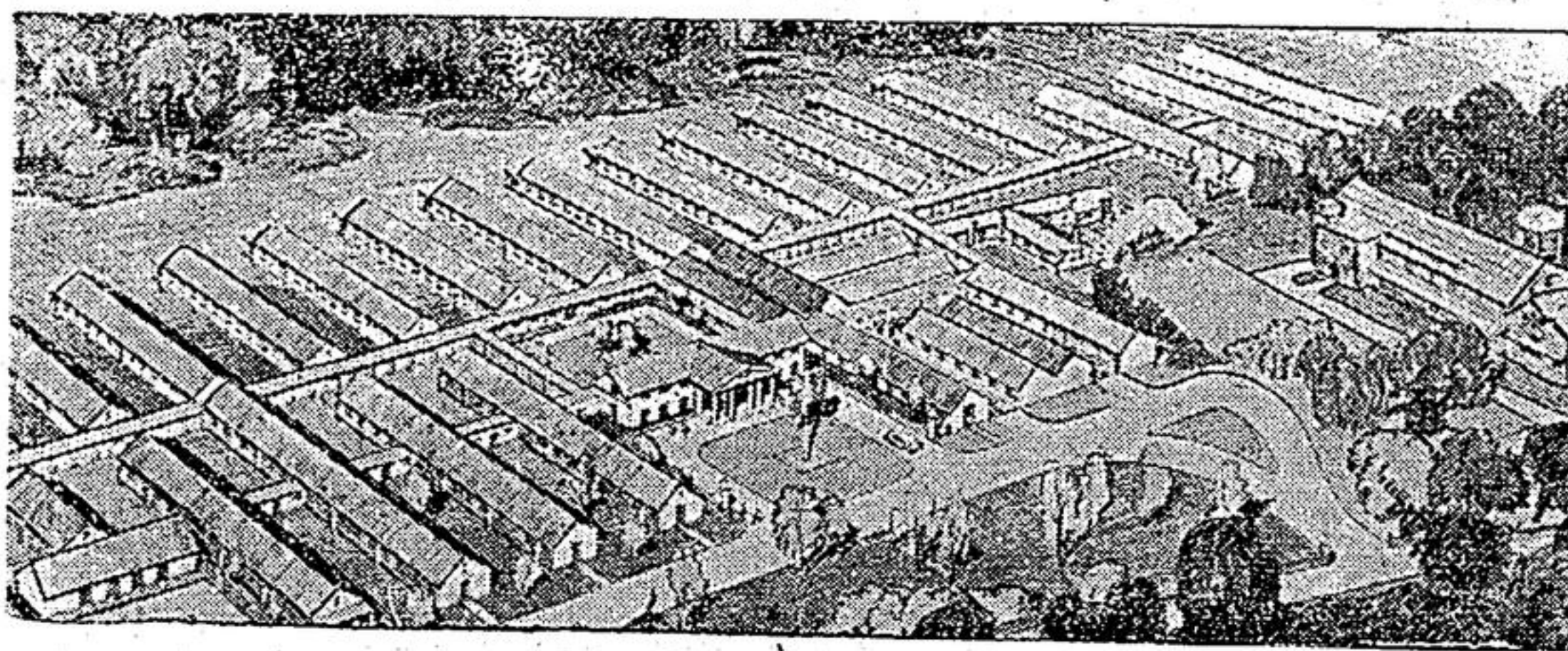

Brings First-Hand Knowledge

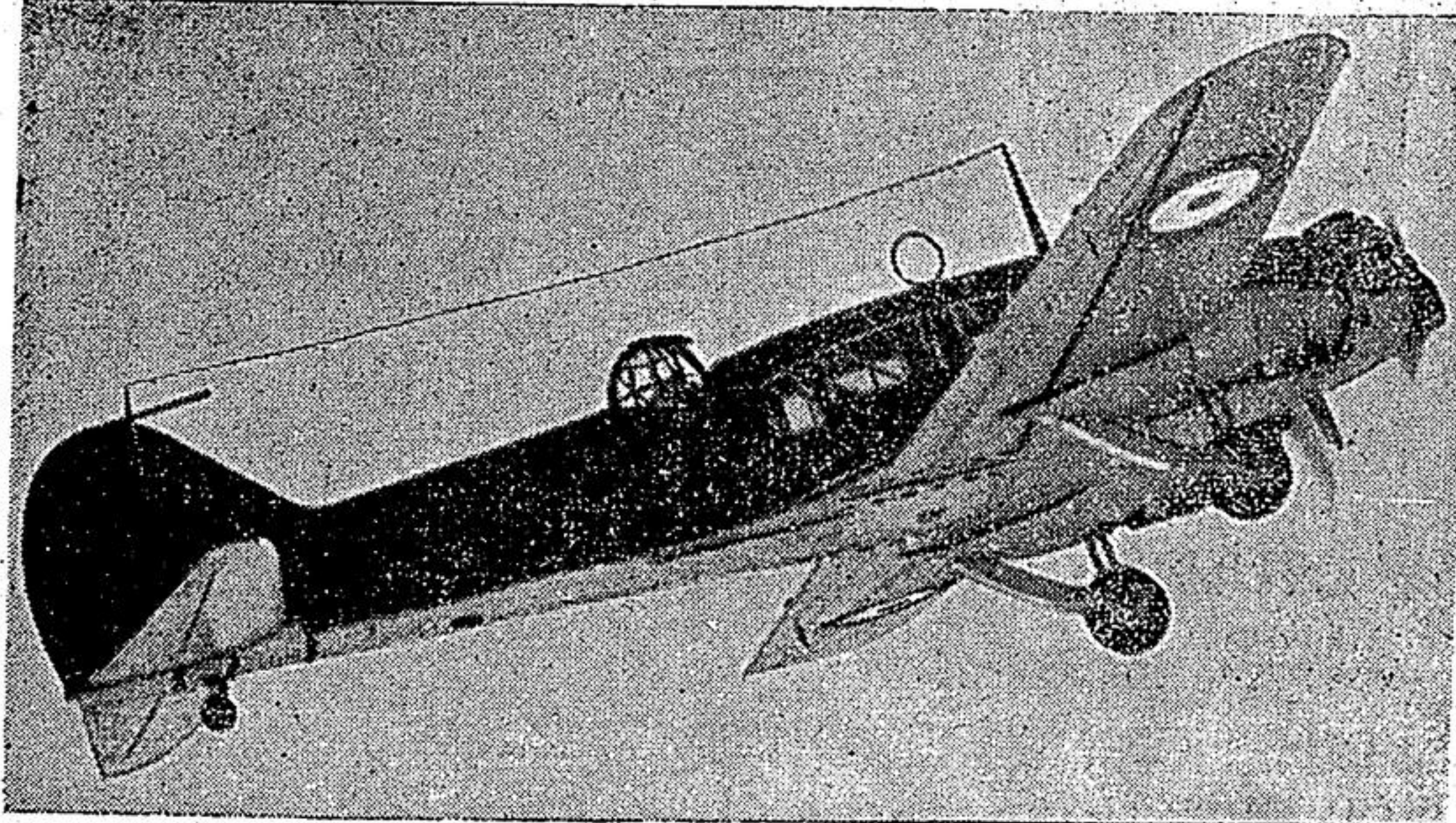

With 600 beds and capable of expansion to 1,000 beds in emergency, the base hospital of the Canadian Red Cross society at Taplow, Eng., will be ready for use in April, it is announced by Dr. Fred W. Routley, national commissioner, who recently returned from Europe. It consists of 41 fireproof buildings, and is believed to be the only military hospital with a research laboratory. Sir Frederick Banting will be research director. Dr. Routley hopes the hospital will be used after the war for underprivileged London children.

First Flight in Canada of Avro Anson Bombers

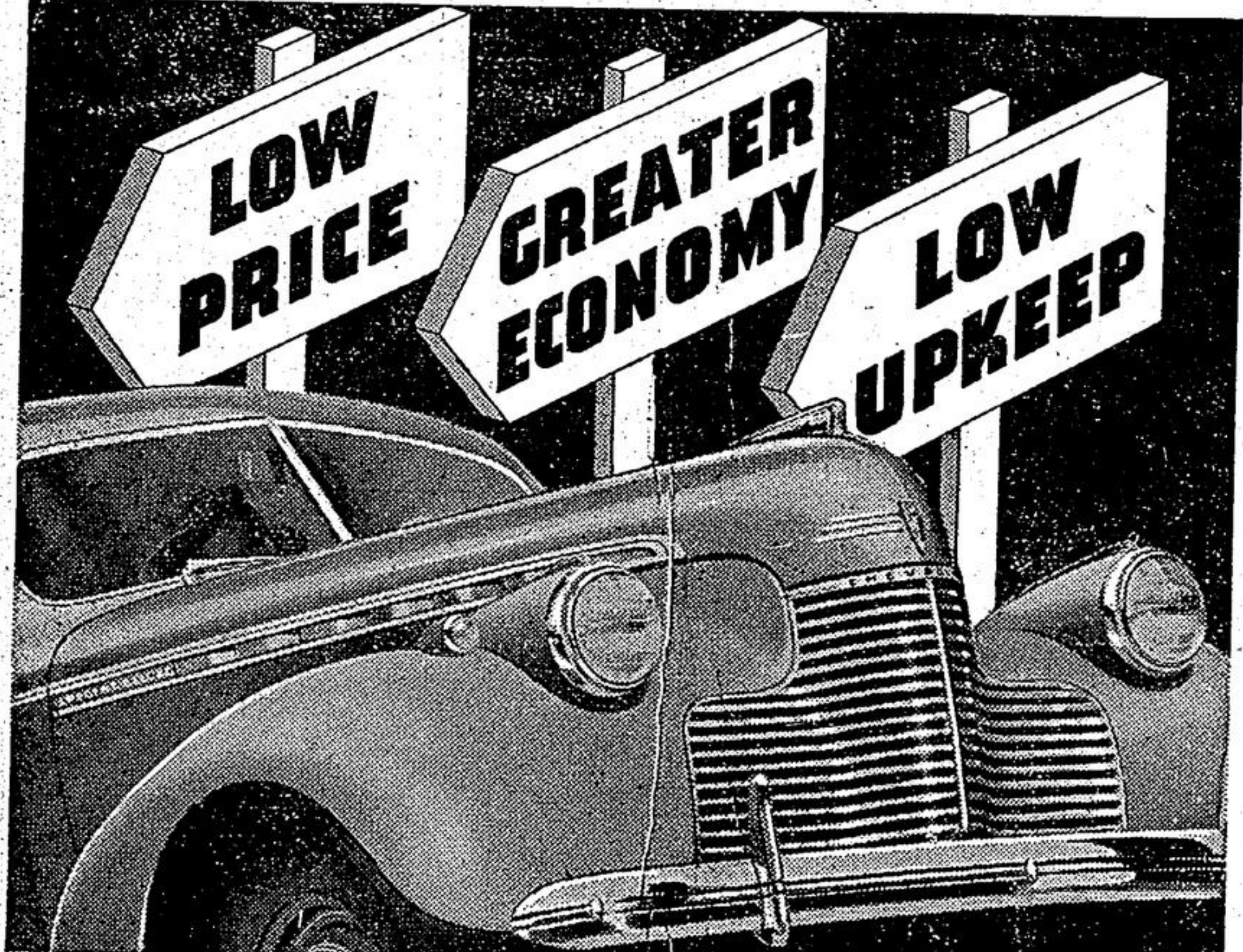


Two big Avro Anson reconnaissance trainer-bombers, the advance guard of more than 1,600 which will come to this country under the commonwealth air-training scheme, were flown for the first time in Canada, Feb. 25. Assembled at the De Havilland Aircraft Co. of Canada plant less than a week after the parts arrived in freight cars, they were tested by G. R. Spradbrow, pilot for John David Eaton, accompanied by J.
