Farm Undergoing Alterations  
The W. Wallace farm on the 8th concession rented by a Toronto party last fall will undergo extensive alterations. The barns are being retableted and a new house will be erected on the property although no contract has been let as yet. Between three and four thousand trees have been planted on the premises to reforest some of the rough slopes just east of the Brook Road. An extensive orchard has also been set out.

Extends Property  
It is understood that Col. Phillips who some time ago purchased a property on the 5th concession north of the village where he has established a summer home and also excellent skiing facilities, has purchased 37 acres additional land from Cecil Storry whose property adjoins the Phillip place.

Council Buys Calcium  
Pickering Township council has ordered a car-load of calcium to be placed on the township roads as soon as possible. Last year in the municipality seventy tons of the dust layer will be used. The cost of the material is borne solely by the municipality in some areas such as the police villages where the traffic is particularly heavy. In all other cases the cost is divided on a fifty per cent basis, those wishing it on roads fronting their properties bearing half the cost.

Some of the heaviest traffic so far this summer flowed through here on Sunday. By actual count 132 cars passed the corners in 7 minutes.

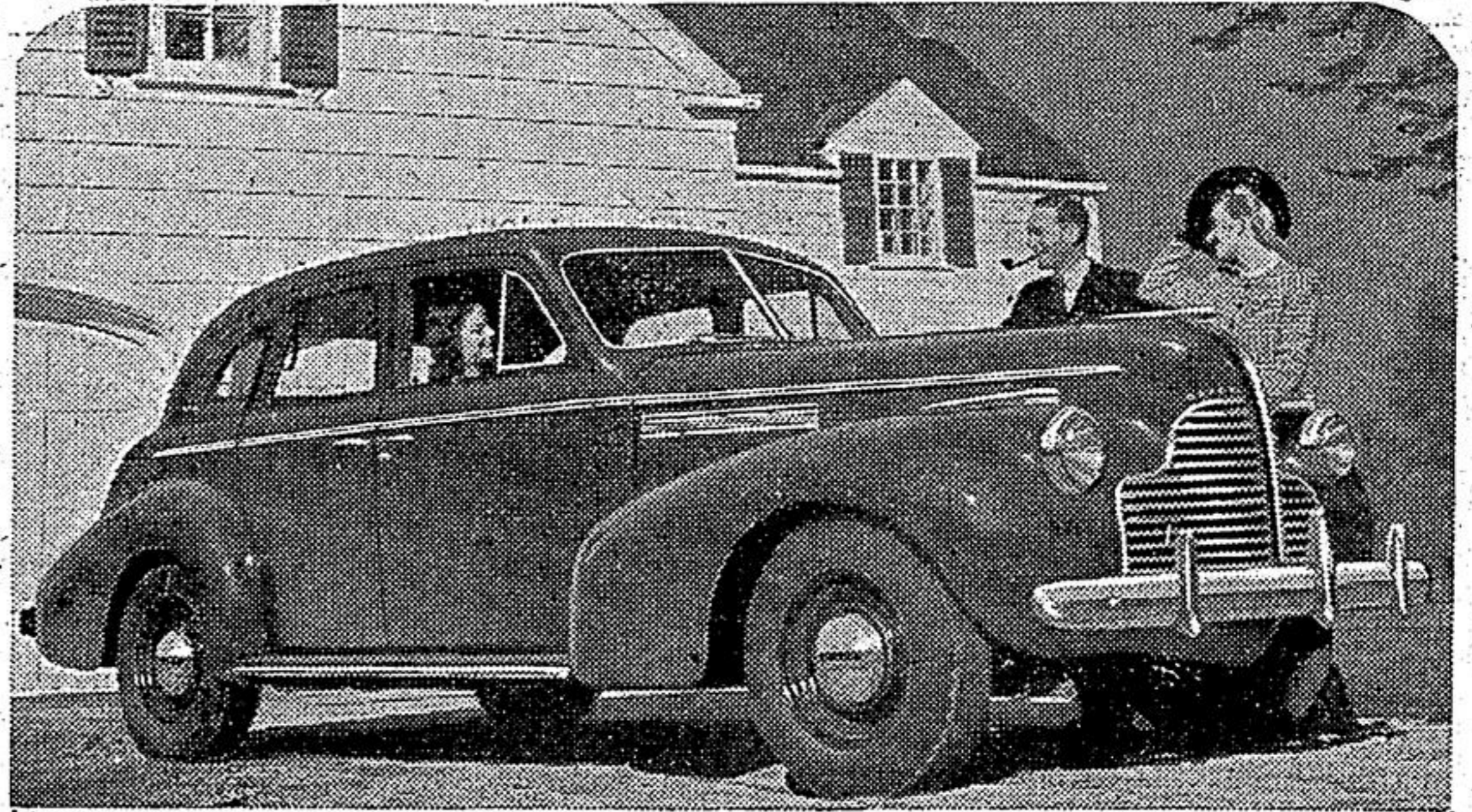
