Melville

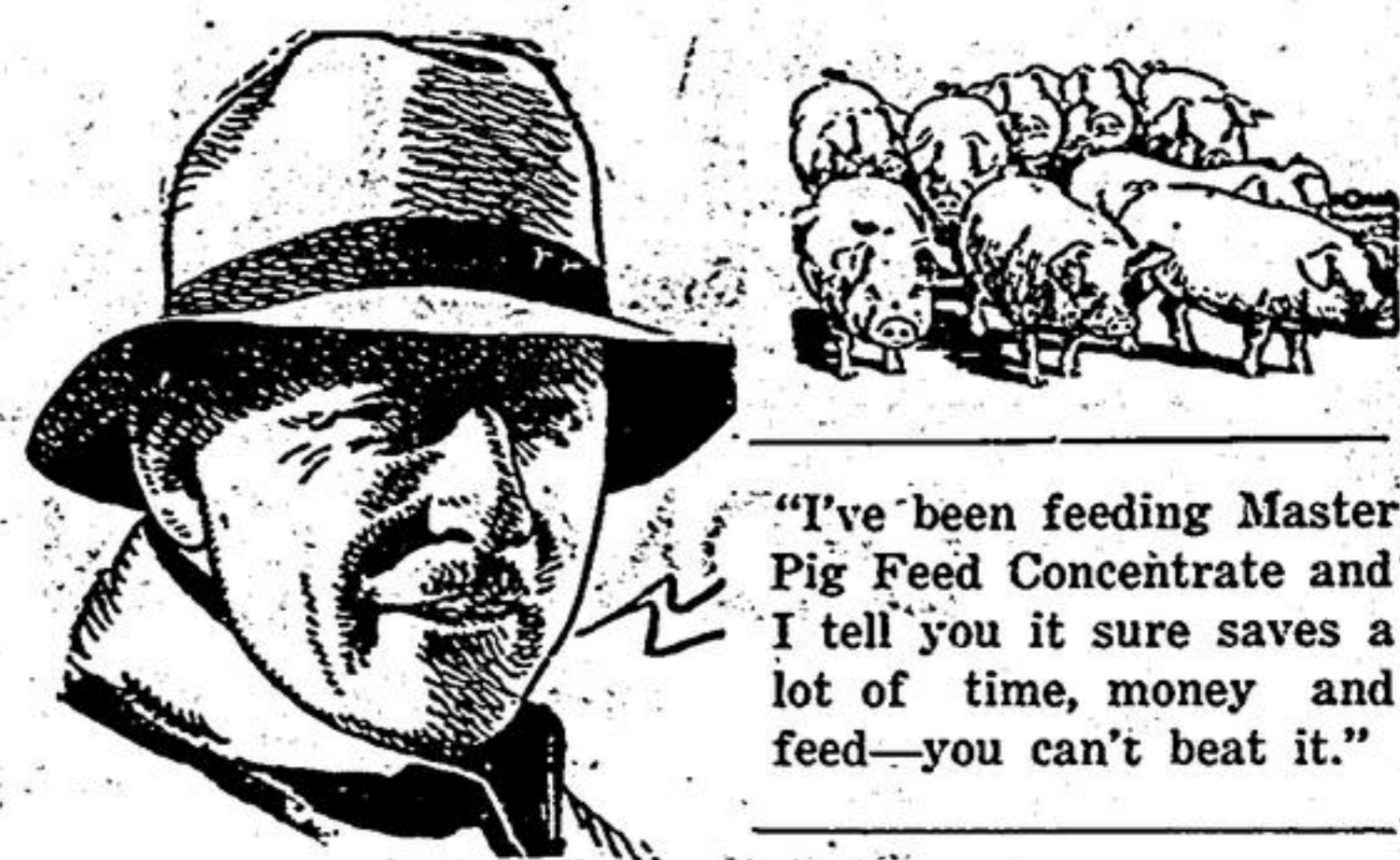
