Messrs. Aylmer and Donald Willson with their families of Toronto attended the decoration services on Sunday afternoon and also visited with their mother.

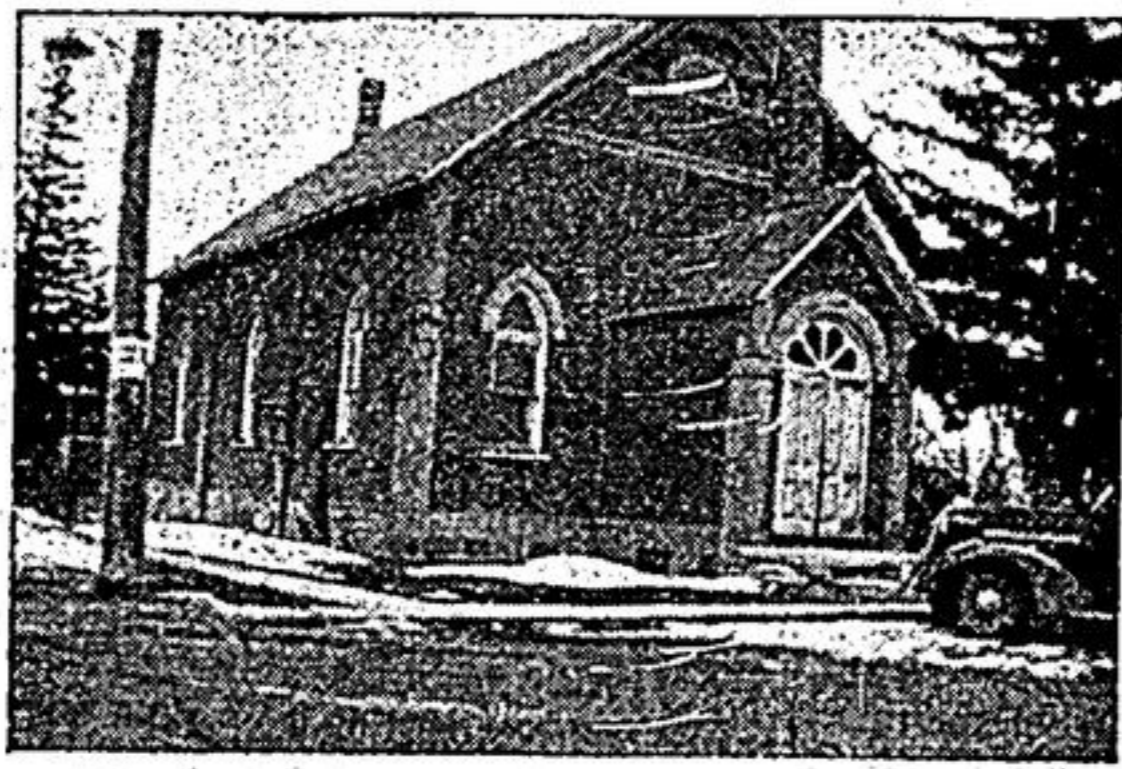
Mrs. L. Story visited her father T. C. Gostic of Stouffville recently.
