 Bethune, Sask.—Funeral services for the late Mrs. William (Esther) Blakley, were held from the United Church here Friday, June 14th, by the Rev. H. E. Coveney, the Church being filled with mourners and sympathising friends. Deceased who was eighty years of age, died rather suddenly June 10th at the home of her son Ernest, when she fell and injured her hip, shock and heart failure causing her death, a few hours later.
