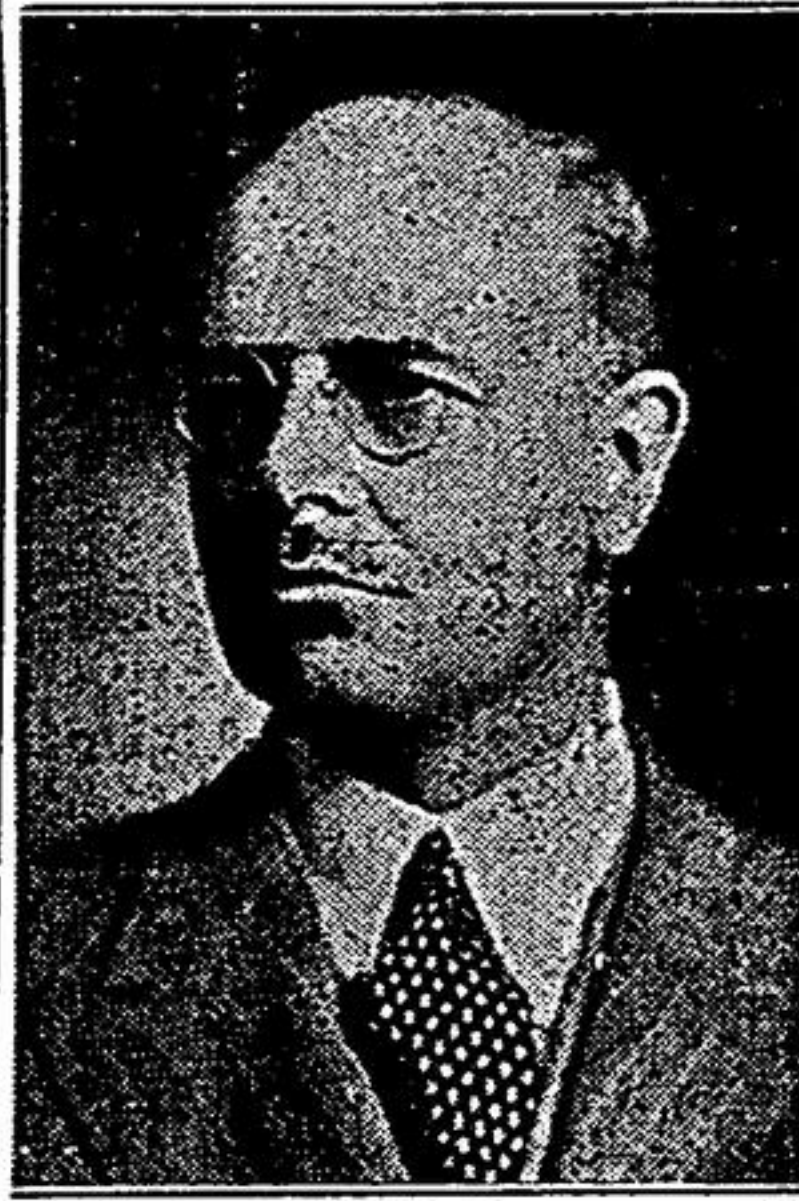

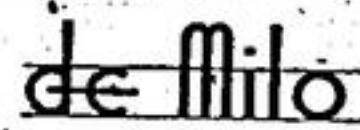

Miss Eva Latham is spending her holidays with her father here.

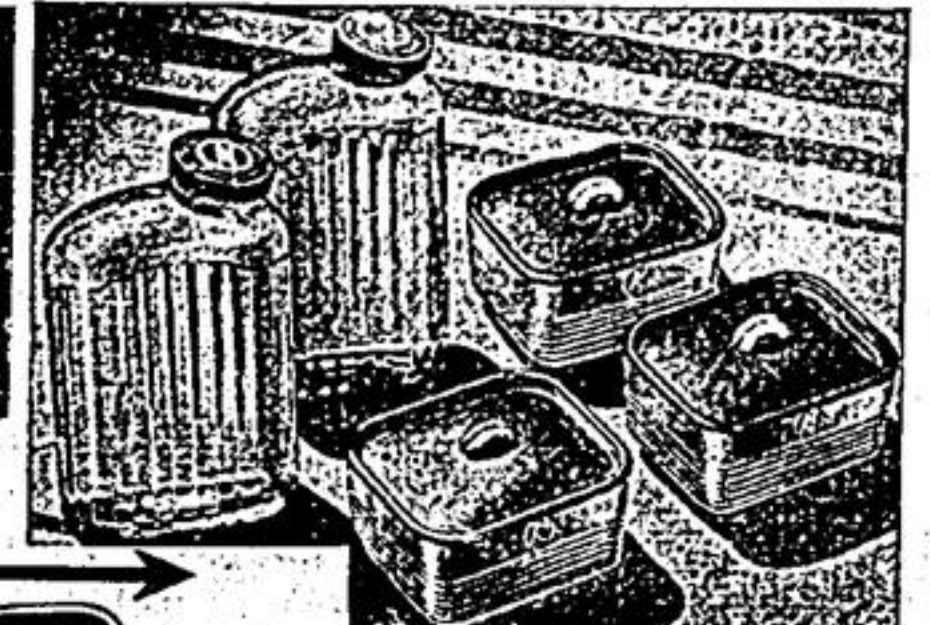
Miss Loraine Todd of Oshawa, Vic. Paxton of Hamilton visited their parents on Sunday.
