This community was shocked to learn of the sudden death of Frank J. Burry, a former resident of this place, who was found dead lying on some hay in the field after a long search. He had been living on the 4th just south of No. 7 highway. On the fatal day he told his wife he was not feeling well and thought he would see the doctor. When he did not return in the afternoon, Mrs. Burry phoned Constable B. Gayman, thinking something might have happened to her husband. It was found Mr. Burry had not been to the doctor and it was thought he might have fallen into the creek at the back of McQuay's house. The constable searched the creek bed a couple of miles, but found nothing. The next morning the neighbors formed a search party to tour the McQuay farm, which borders the Burry home. About a 100 feet from his house the body was found in a hay field beside one of the piles. It was thought he had been dead about thirty-six hours. An autopsy was conducted by Coroner Dr. S. S. Ball of Stouffville on Wednesday. Mr. Burry had a sale here of his stock only last spring.
