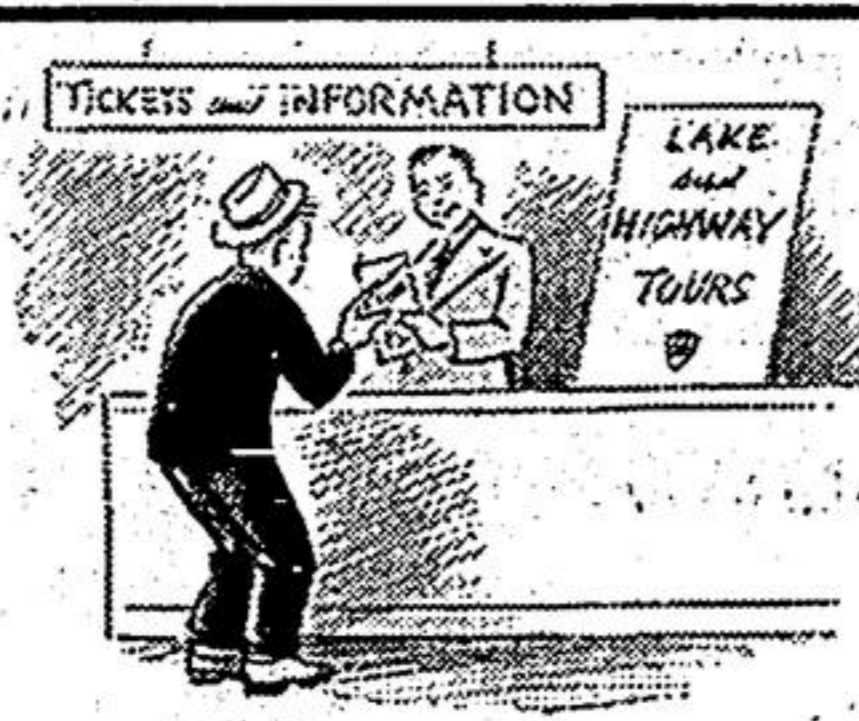
Personal Paragraphs

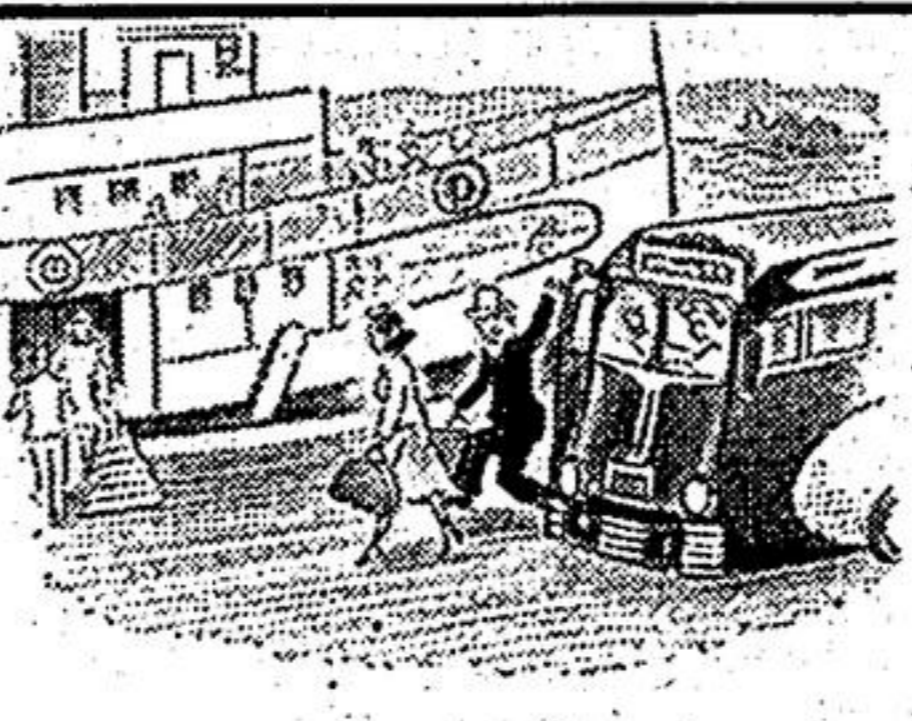
