NEW TAXES MAY FORCE BAKERS TO ASK 9c LOAF

Information came out from Ottawa last week warning bakers, against increasing bread prices beyond ten cents per loaf, because of the new impost on processed flour. This edict will not affect the local bakery and some of the other small bakeries who deliver in this town, and are selling their products for 8c per loaf. It is altogether likely these local shops will have to step bread up a cent, but at that they would be below the ten cent top. Toronto bread sells for ten cents in the local stores, but the best local loaf is still going at 8c, we learn on Monday. No one would blame the man selling for 8c should he increase his price one cent to take care of the added costs imposed recently, which cannot be readily met from the small margin of profit. Enquiry at the local bakery, we learn from Mr. Stover that no decision has been reached, although he admits that the margin between production costs and selling price is too dangerous at 8c.

So Wrote a Stouffville Reporter 45 Years ago in a special editorial in the village paper of that time.

In the office of this paper there is a small picture of Musselman's Lake taken 50 years ago. There wasn't a building to be seen on the whole shore line, but a few evergreen trees dotted the barren waste land in that day was not highly held.

However, a reporter then wrote that some day there might be cottages on the shores of this little lake, and he wasn't far astray, for the population today at Musselman's exceeds the population of the village of Stouffville during the summer season.

Accompanying the picture mentioned here, an article was printed with it, which reads: "A few miles north from Stouffville lies the lovely little sheet of water, a natural spring, known as Musselman's Lake. Everybody picnics at the lake, and yet its beauty is not appreciated as it should be. Where can one find a prettier spot? Here and there the shores are banked with evergreen." Then the article quotes from the pen of a visitor who wrote of this lake: "Rising nowhere and emptying nowhere, this picturesque body of water has a little world of its own, and tell eloquently enough of the wonderful spring which feeds it. A few cottages and the odd yacht are needed to make Musselman's Lake the paradise it could be. Yes, a little money is needed to be spent in beautifying the place which is worthy of the 'quarter mile of ripples to which the shores are related.'"

All this written just 50 years ago.
