The council was confronted for the first time on Tuesday with a bill from their Township Constable Mr. Chester, for gas used while on the business of the municipality. The amount was for 30 gallons costing about \$10. Constable Chester receives a salary of \$60 per month and as no allowance has been made for the payment of mileage or was bills, the matter was let stand.

A motion was proposed by Deputy Reeve Down and seconded by Elmer Powell that the Department of Highways be notified regarding the bad condition of various points along the abandoned new four-lane highway where the township roads were torn up and left ungravelled. The point where the new highway crossed the townline was cited as an exceptionally bad place.

Road accounts passed totalled \$1,532.29 and General accounts \$345.10.

On August 19, 20, and 21 a great army of Canadian people—all those, male or female, over the age of 16—will move out to the points of registration and fill in the cards containing a number of questions.

In Stouffville, we understand that arrangements have been made to make use of Ratcliff's Hall where several officials will have their desks and take down the answer to your questions as published in this paper last week. You should clip out the questions and fill them in with lead pencil and take them with you to the hall, so that you may be able to give prompt answers. Throughout the townships, a place will be fixed in every polling division, we expect and it will be up to the individual to enquire where he may register on these dates.

Why is this registration taking place? This country is at war. It must put forth the utmost possible effort to accomplish its purpose. That purpose is the defeat of the enemy.

In order to do this it must marshal the full forces of the nation—all the human, moral, material and spiritual forces of Canada.

There will be no slacking. We need more planes, tanks, ammunition. To produce them we need more men, women, materials, money. The nation must produce more, spend less, and to be frank about it—pay more taxes. Then it is necessary that our young men should be trained for home defence. They will be called up at an early date for a brief period of intensive military training.

Yes, we are at war. Registration means simply organization for greater effort—for victory. Register early. To answer the questions takes only a few minutes' work if you come prepared to answer. Read the questions in last week's paper, know the answers you have to make before you go to register.
