Court Dismisses Accident Case

veloped a flat tire one mile north of Ringwood. He stopped the car fully 18 inches clear of the centre line, jacked the car up and proceeded to fix the left front tire when he was struck by the Bruce car. He received three fractures of the leg, slight concussion of the brain, head injury and severe arm injury and a general shaking up. He was in the hospital for six weeks and in bed for seventeen weeks.

"Could you give any reason for not going to the shoulder of the road?" asked Mr. Line.

"It was muddy. My wife was in the car and I didn't want to get stuck. It was a clear night and all the lights of my car were on."

"Mrs. Davies stated that the car was stopped right at the edge of the pavement. She couldn't say if any part of her husband's body protruded over the edge of the car or not. She didn't feel any great impact. This car went on for a mile or a mile and a quarter, then backed up not very far away. She called to them for help.

George Peck, who lives a short distance from where the accident happened, and who was up looking after the chickens, heard a thud and screams of a woman. He saw this car backing up in a zig-zag manner. "Mr. Arsenault's breath smelt very strongly of liquor and Mr. Bruce didn't come very near me," he stated. He said "I thought I hit something." By that time they had both started to smoke. Mrs. Davies said "Let's do something," and then Bruce said "Let's take him to a doctor." Witness stated that if the car had started Mr. Davies' feet would have been run over at the ankle. His head was at an angle in a southwesterly direction. The right front wheel of the Davies' car was as close to the edge of the pavement as possible."

Constable Ben. Gayman, who took measurements, swore that the rear left wheel of the car was 6 feet east of the centre line. The left front wheel was 16 inches east of the centre line. The blood marks were on the west side of the orange line.

Constable Robert Windsor, testified that he couldn't find any skid or brake marks on the highway. "Accused stated he thought he had sideswiped the truck and he wasn't going to stop until Mr. Arsenault said he had better stop. I could smell liquor on both accused and Arsenault. They admitted having a quart of beer each in Toronto at 8 o'clock that night. Bruce refused to be examined at a doctor's office in Mount Albert." The officer also mentioned that the brakes on the Bruce car were very poor. All the Davies' car was east of the centre line and he estimated that it might have been knocked to the east 10 inches.

Bruce said that he could not tell if the Davies' car was moving or not. There was no definite impact. Mr. Arsenault said that he left a slight impact. He had had two or three bottles of beer and Bruce had only taken one.
