S.S. Workers Hold Convention

Workers' Conference in the interest of Sunday School work was held last Monday evening at Second Markham Baptist Church, under the auspices of the Markham Township Religious Education Council. Although this gathering was an experiment, the result exceeded the Executive's expectations in that the church was practically filled with Sunday School workers from the various schools of the township. It was felt by the Committee that sufficient time was not given at the annual convention for discussion of Sunday School problems, and many of the workers were unable to attend this annual meeting because of their employment throughout the day. The meeting was under the enthusiastic leadership of Mr. Don. Ratcliff, President of the Council. Mr. Garnet Williamson, a Sunday School Superintendent with many years experience conducted a devotional period as a sample of what the devotional period of the Sunday School should be. An address on the subject, "The Value and Purpose of the Devotional Period in

the Sunday School" was given by Mr. Oliver Raymer, well-known leader of the men's Bible Class of the People's Church of Toronto brought this address. He stressed the spiritual aims of the Sunday School, and declared that this period should create an atmosphere for an effective presentation of the lesson. A discussion followed in which several people spoke.

The second address was given by Rev. P. G. Lehman, of Mount Joy, who spoke on the subject, "Teaching Hints For The S. S. Teacher." The speaker declared that the teacher must be conscious of personal fitness, for the task at hand and at the same time have a sense of responsibility. Then followed some practical hints which would make for successful teaching of the lesson—This subject was also discussed. The leaders of the discussions were Ewart Stiver of Unionville and Lambert Stouffer, of Stouffville.

Music was rendered by a quartette from the Stouffville M.B.C. Church.

Conference closed with the benediction by Rev. Mr. Orr, of Melville United Church.
