Offer 250 Pheasant Licenses For Pickering

Council in Session on Tuesday Not Unfavorable to Hepburn 2-Year Municipal Term.

If the ratepayers of the Township of Pickering wish to retain the one year term for councillors it may be necessary for them to petition the council at the next meeting to submit the question to the ratepayers on the first day of January. At the regular meeting on Tuesday of this week, Reeve Wm. Reesor said that personally he had always felt that the two year term gave councilmen a better chance to serve their municipality.

Councillor Robt. Ruddy agreed with the views of the reeve, and also pointed out that submission of the question on January 1, might cause an election where there might otherwise be none. The sentiment of the council seemed to be that if the one year term is to be retained it is up to the ratepayers to submit the necessary petition. In Pickering Township it requires about 200 signatures to force the council to submit the issue.

The first division of the \$3,256 for war charities which is Pickering's share of the Ontario County grant was made on Tuesday when a motion was passed assigning \$50 to Kinsale branch of the Red Cross which had requested some of the fund, \$500 to Claremont and \$500 to Pickering branches. This still leaves a substantial amount to be divided among the township war workers at a later date.

Relief for the past month stood at \$156.90. Relief officer Morley reported 21 individuals on the roll making up 11 families. This is the smallest number to receive relief in Pickering in four years.

The Township has crushed over 1,400 yards of gravel for the County recently for which they have received \$685.70, which makes a substantial payment on the month's road accounts of \$1,439.88.

Sheep claims for September amounted to \$87.35. James Carter, Jr., 9th con., claimed for 1 lamb killed \$8.75; Gordon Fisher, 9th con. 5 sheep and 1 lamb killed and 4 lambs injured \$63.60; Col. W. E. Phillips, 9th con., 2 lambs killed \$15.00.

The pheasant shoot dates have been announced as Friday and Saturday, October 25, 26. There will be four hundred resident licenses and 250 non-resident licenses issued.
