Four hundred bottles have completely disappeared in a few weeks, we are told, and yet eighty per cent of the householders return the bottles promptly.

This is astounding information. and such as should cause everybody to be very careful. The present loss only means two bottles to a house on the average, but the total is serious to the dairy firm.

Some people do not know that it is illegal to use milk bottles for putting down fruit, or storing anything whatever in, yet this is 'the fact Persons guilty of using property that does not belong to them this way are few, of course, hence H. L. Turper officiated. The Ontario Department of Agri-the more common offender against the dairy are those people who allow the bettles to pile up around their home. If you belong to this group do your part at once in returning those empties which the dairy so badly needs.
