# Stouffville Farmer Wins State Award

Following his outstanding success at the International Plowing Match at St. Thomas where he won the right to represent Ontario at the first national match for the State of Iowa held at Davenport a city of 56,000, Fred Timbers of Stouffville walked off with the championship of the big state match there on Tuesday this week. The contest was a prelude to the national cornhusking contest so popular over the state, and which Fred intended to see.

Fred scored 92.95 points to nose out Greme Stewart of Plainfield, Ill. who took second with a mark of 92. Another Yankee contestant, George Susemehl of Naperville, Ill., scored 91.25, while Alex. Black of Gueph Ontario, stood fourth with 89.5. A third Canadian George Hostrosser of Malton finished 10th with 83.5.

News of the result of this win was broadcast over all news stations throughout the United States and Canada Wednesday morning, heralded as the great farming event of the year.
