But with the coming of war, more particularly with national realization of the imminence of the Nazi menace, the song came into its own. Today it is the universal rallying cry of the Commonwealth which owes a melodious debt to these two musicians whose co-operative tune child has now almost attained the dignity of a national anthem.**
