Markham Twp. Ratepayers

The Municipal Council of the Township of Markham desire to draw the attention of their electors to the following provision of the Local Government Extension Act 1940.

The Council may, on the polling day for the election of members of the Council for 1941, submit to a vote of the Municipal Electors the following question.

"Are you in favour, as a wartime measure under the Local Government Extension Act, 1940 of the Municipal Council elected for 1941 holding office for the term of two years?"

Or, if a petition signed by at least five per centum of the total number of persons whose names appear on the last Voters' List for use at Municipal Elections, requesting the Council to submit such question, if filed with the Clerk not later than five weeks before polling, (January 6th, 1941) the Council shall submit such question to a vote.
