SUDDENLY IN HOSPITAL

The news of the death of one of our farmers Eric Pearce came with shooking suddenness on Monday evening. Mr. Pearce had rushed to St. Michael's Hospital for an appendix operation, but failed to rally from the ordeal, and died the same day that he was admitted. He was in his 38th year and is survived by his wife and three children. The family located here about seven years ago, coming from Newcastle district. Widespread sympathy is being expressed on every hand.

Appearing in court at Whitby last week the hit and run motorists, Norman Reynolds and Lawrence Hood, both of Greenbank, were allowed out on bail of \$5,000 and \$1,000 respectively, on a charge of failing to remain at the scene of an accident in which a man was killed. Reynolds is said to be the driver of the death car while Hood was his companion who aided him in attempting to escape. Reynolds only 19 years old, and Hood 17, both sons of Greenbank families, east of Uxbridge

.The dead man Louis Arbourne 22 also a Greenbank farm hand was killed by a hit and run motorist just south of the hamlet of Greenbank. He was walking along the road with companion named Kenneth Rodd who jumped just in time to escape injury. Arbourne died soon after being hit, but the fleeing car made every effort to escape without rendering aid.

The fugitives travelled south to Claremont then to Stouffville and attempted to have a smashed head light repaired at Hackney's garage. The fugitives said they had struck a cow. Not being able to procure a lense here they got one at Uxbridge where another trumped-up yarn was handed out about running into a ditch.


