He was pastor at Ekira, Coldwater, Ottawa and Fergus, going to Edmonton six years ago. He served as chaplain in the first great war.

Stouffville Board of Health Monday evening decided to inaugurate a regular inspection of farm premises whose owners are supplying milk to the local dairy. This is in line with what should have been done years ago, and which is observed in other places. Farmers selling milk to Toronto dairies, for instance, must submit to inspection by the city and maintain a standard of cleanliness not found in many other stables. Cattle too are inspected. A recent inspection carried out by the Ontario Dept. of Health revealed that most of the stables now supplying milk to this town are in splendid condition, but not all of them. At the same time the Dept. placed its stamp of approval on the equipment of the local dairy premises as being capable of producing a highly satisfactory, clean product.

## Long Illness Proves Fatal to T. C. Gostick

Highly respected resident of Stouffville, Thomas C. Gostick died at his residence here on Friday afternoon, following a prolonged illness. He was in his 81st year.

A native of Pickering Township and a son of the late Thomas Gostick, he was born on a farm on the 7th line, which had been in the family for more than 100 years. The farm is at present occupied by an only surviving brother, Fred.

Mr. Gostick continued to farm in Pickering Township until his retirement some five years ago, when he took up residence in Stouffville. He was a Baptist, serving as a deacon in the Claremont Baptist Church for more than 50 years, an office which he held up to the time of his death.

Mr. Gostick was married twice, and is survived by his second wife, formerly Louise Jane Wright, and one daughter, Mrs. Charles Storry and two sons, Charles and Frank, all of Pickering.

The Gostick family have adhered to the Baptist faith for generations. The father of the deceased was a local preacher, while his grandfather was an ordained Baptist preacher. He had a small church in Pickering which stood near the site of the present old Gostick cemetery. He is remembered for his outstanding work among young people.

An old friend of the family and formerly of Claremont, Rev. A. R. Park of Aurora, preached the funeral service on Monday afternoon, from the Baptist church. Rev. W. Daniels Claremont officiated. Assisting were Rev. D. Macgregor and Rev. L. E. Atkinson. Interment was made at the Stouffville cemetery. Pall bearers were Messrs. T. Paterson, Evans Ward, Morgan Pugh, William Ratcliff, Jacob Meyers, James Coates.
