Only One Township Around Stouffville Fails to take Vote

Although it was generally understood there would be no vote on the two-year term for councillors in Pickering Township, the council on Monday passed the necessary bylaw to submit the issue to the tax payers. The vote will be taken on January 6th, the municipal election date.

At the same time Markham Council in session on Saturday scarcely gave the question any consideration, and it is presumed there will be no submission of the issue to the ratepayers.

As matters stand in the surrounding district, those councils submitting the issue to the electors are Uxbridge Township, Whitechurch, Pickering Township, Stouffville, Markham village and township up to Monday night were still withholding the vote from the ratepayers.

Newmarket killed the two-year term on Monday by 251 for, and 468 against. North Gwillimbury also defeated two year terms by a narrow majority.

Only three people voted for the longer term in Shelbourne. Throughout Ontario where early elections were held on Monday not a single township save one of the York's supported the two-year-term, and out of fifteen places voting, townships, towns, and cities six of the larger places gave favorable majorities for the new term.
