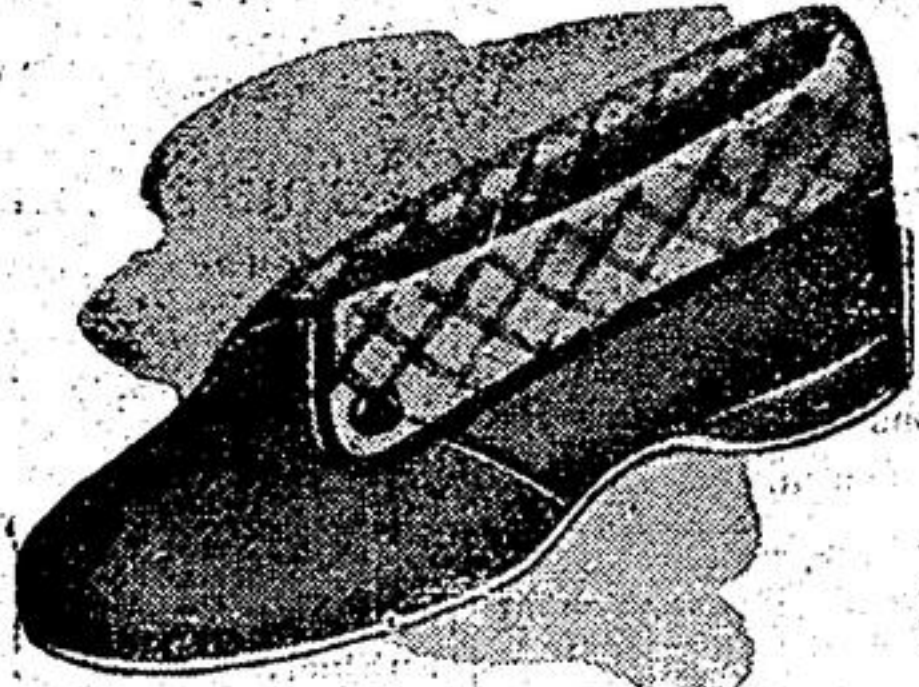

He declared that the organization was non-political and non-partisan, designed solely to affiliate the work of the numerous smaller organizations as the voice of the farmer into a central agency that would carry much more weight in solving the many difficulties that beset the present
