BUDGET EXPENDED FOR ROAD UPKEEP

Whitchurch Township Council on Monday marked their final meeting of the year by sanctioning some \$3,688 for road work expenditures. The council have expended their total allotment budgeted for at the beginning of the year, and although there was some difficulty in securing trucks for hauling gravel this fall, feel that the work has been done well, and good winter roads are anticipated.

J. A. Clark and Pat. Murphy seem to keep sheep that the dogs have a special liking for, and each had small claims for damage caused by dogs in the month of November. They were approved and paid.

The council petitioned the Dominion Government along with other municipalities to allow free transportation to soldiers in uniform for Christmas and New Year season. Councillors Kidd and Wells sponsored the resolution, a copy of which will go to Ottawa.

Hospitalization costs for Nov. were \$94.12 while Dr. Williams, M.O.H. was paid \$270 for his services. The M.O.H. pay was determined quite definitely several years ago, when the court approved the amount Dr. Williams demanded. All members of council were present for this meeting.
