Mourn Death of Pioneer Mother at Cedar Grove

Members of one of the early pioneer families of the Cedar Grove district, Mrs. Agnes Sarah Milroy Burrows, died on Saturday at her home on the Tenth Line, Markham Township. She was 86 years of age.

For the past quarter of a century Mrs. Burrows had resided in the Markham district, taking up residence there following the death of her husband. Born in 1854, the daughter of the late James Milroy Cella Anthony, she spent her early life in Cedar Grove.

In 1881 she was married to Jas. Burrows and ten years later the couple moved to Scarboro Township where they resided for nearly 25 years.

She is survived by two brothers, E. A. Milroy of Agincourt, and Robert Milroy of Highland Creek, a sister, Mrs. Herbert Beech of Ringwood; four sons, Roy, Lloyd, Ernest and Arnold, and three daughters, Mrs. J. A. Fleming, Mrs. C. W. Knowles and Miss Marion, at home.

The funeral service took place on Tuesday at 2:30 p.m., at Zion Church Cedar Grove. Interment at Zion Cemetery.
