Local Residents May Get Hospitalization on an Insurance Basis

Stouffville may soon be able to enter the scheme for combined hospital care for all its people who subscribe to the service at a very nominal sum. This is something this paper has strongly favored for years, and we are elated over the assurance coming from Toronto on Tuesday that this town in company with other municipalities are to be accorded the benefits of hospitalization on an insurance plan basis.

Following its policy of working in close co-operation with the medical profession, the Ontario Hospital Association has notified all physicians in the Province that a Plan for Hospital Care will probably be inaugurated here shortly, under the auspices of the O.H.A.

This is a development of the recent conference held by a committee of the Association with Dr. C. Itus Reem, director of the commission on hospital care for the American Hospital Association.

According to tentative arrangements, the plan will be a non-profit community effort for the benefit of the low-wage earner. There will be no door-to-door canvassing and no paid agents; members of the board of administration will work without remuneration and there will be neither stockholders nor dividends. All benefits as the organization grows will accrue to its subscribers.

For a purely nominal sum, the employed worker will be able to secure adequate hospital care for himself when needed, and for a slightly larger sum may obtain similar benefits for his dependents. Groups, rather than individuals, will be encouraged to become subscribers, since experience elsewhere has proved that this lessens overhead costs, it is stated.

The parcels are sent from New York on American expert liner to Lisbon, where they are taken over by International Red Cross representatives who guarantee their safe delivery to the prisoners. The parcels go to Marseilles on a Red Cross ship which is permitted to pass through the British blockade. They are then put aboard a Red Cross train bound for Geneva, and their distribution to the prisoners is handled from this point.

About \$5,000 of the food parcels which left Toronto recently are aboard a ship carrying American Red Cross supplies to Europe.

The parcels of food, each of which contains a sufficiently balanced diet to last a prisoner a full week, are being packed in Toronto at the present time. The original output of the depot, which has been open four weeks, was 5,000 parcels a week, but the machinery has been speeded up to produce twice that number.

The Canadian Red Cross is supplying the food at the direct request of the British Red Cross, whose work along these lines in Britain has been hampered by enemy air-raids.
