reeve and council believed the company should have paid. However, the reduced premium was the chief factor in making the change. F. A. Lundy, Newmarket, is the agent for Norwich.

There are only five cases of relief in the township with \$55 expended in February, hence council gave some thought to pay of the two relief officers. Last year, the two township police officers acting as relief officers, each received \$75 for his services. "There isn't a case on the west side and I don't see how we can pay a man \$75 for so little work," observed a member. The idea of paying the officers so much per trip was suggested. Councillor Kidd said that might run even more than \$75, so council decided to wait until April meeting before determining the rate or method of payment.

"I think relief will be down, and there may be little or no relief all summer," said Reeve Toole.

The Reeve said he had not received a single complaint about the winter roads so far, and was very happy over the situation. It was revealed that to date about \$2,000 had been spent for road work of all kinds, mostly for the operation of the big grader plow and the Windsor plow, and it was agreed they had done a grand job. "Our roads have been open in many parts even when the county roads were blocked," said Reeve Toole.

However, in anticipation of another winter and high prices for snow fencing, it was moved and seconded by Councillors Kidd and Leary that 8,000 feet of new fence be procured with 600 posts. The motion carried.

Regret was expressed over the illness of Deputy Reeve Jess Cook who was reported very ill again.
