A new electric bottle washer was installed in the Maple Leaf Dairy here last week which will speed up, as well as, ease up, the work of this operation. The new washer puts the bottles through the three processes of washing, sterilizing and steaming. The bottles themselves are not touched by human hands, and do not have to be removed from the cases. Entire cases of containers are fed into the machine at a time. This is a far step from the old method of handling each bottle separately on a revolving brush.

The bounty for each wolf killed in the Province of Ontario after March 1st, 1941, has been raised from \$15 to \$25 a head. Application for bounty must be made within six months after wolf is killed. A heavier penalty for claiming bounty on wolf not killed in Ontario is provided. The purpose of the increase is to encourage hunters to capture the wolves and thus save the deer and the flocks of the agriculturalist.

The sum of \$34.00 was taken in a collection at the 6th Annual Banquet of the York County Holstein Breeders Association at Agincourt Monday. This amount will be forwarded to the War Victims' Fund in Toronto. It is expected that the holstein breeders across the Dominion will make a further donation to the war effort this spring, in the form of a calf sale. It is understood that 100 of the finest holstein calves will be donated from breeders across the Dominion. It is expected that many more than 100 will be donated but these will be culled down to just the best. The day previous to the big holstein sale held annually in May, these calves will be put on the block, and no doubt buyers will be drawn from long distances, even the States, to purchase this fancy stock. We are told that registered calves, such as will no doubt be in the group, may bring as high as \$500. The money realized from this sale will also be turned over to war relief.

We note by the annual report of the Municipal Statistics issued by the Department of Municipal Affairs, that the village of Stouffville is credited with having five miles of water mains, 52 commercial customers, and 420 residential consumers. It also reveals that this village is one of thirty of thirty-five in Ontario that does not have to pay the water system for the use of its hydrants. A few years ago Stouffville charged the general tax-payers \$600 per year for hydrant rental water, and this money swelled the coffers of the water account. However, this Dept. did not need the revenue and it has therefore been discontinued, and ratepayers now get water laid down in the mains for fire protection absolutely free.
