## WAR NOT ENDLESS STRUGGLE AS SOME PEOPLE MAY THINK

phatically. "He has made too many serious mistakes for that. The water is still ours, and will always place a limit on the scope of German exploits."

"I am convinced the time is gone by for invasion," said Mr. Reade. "If it had been coming at all, it should have come last fall, before Britain had fully re-organized her defense system."

France forced Germany to adopt Blitz tactics, and now our allies, the Greeks have learned the lesson well. They haven't made a single mistake in their defensive campaign.

"Now that Hitler himself has failed in his supreme counter-offensive effort, which incidentally cost him, 32,000 men, I believe the Italian campaign in Albania is nearly over," stated Mr. Reade.

As to what we have done in the way of production, where it previously took three months to equip a division, Britain is now doing it in fourteen days.

To the question frequently raised in the United States as to the struggle ending a deadlock, Mr. Reade's only answer was that people who raised such a question had never read history:

"Europe is not self-sufficient, and he who cannot command the sea, cannot command Europe," he said. The economic aspect looms large, since Europe is dependent on trade moving from east to west, not to live as a single unit with Berlin as the economic centre.

"To add up the aggregate output of all the manufacturing establishments of the conquered nations of Europe, as a fair measurement of Hitler's strength is fantastic nonsense," stated Mr. Reade. From Schneider's huge plants in France to Skoda's of Czechoslovakia, all are dependent upon the import of outside raw materials, iron ore, manganese, etc. Most of these countries are liabilities to Hitler, not assets.

Laughter followed the speaker's reference to the cows on the Plains of Picardy. "The cows weren't milked for days, and something went wrong with them, I'm not sure just what. Milk cows in Norway are being killed for beef."

**Time to Establish New Front**  
"The time has come for the British to establish a new front, and I do not believe the battle will be long. When combatants come to grips in modern warfare, decisive results come in a short time. This was demonstrated by German's campaign against Italy. There will not be another Dunkerque. British forces are setting the pace in south-eastern Europe and will meet the Germans in the Gdeek mountains, a kind of fighting terrain, the Nazis know nothing about."

## SHOVELLED A MILE OF ROAD

The caption on this item would be most ordinary occurrence in Whitchurch only a few years ago, but this last two winters to shovel a mile of road, is, to say the least something unusual. So much for the big snow plows. Last week about 15 men had to open the Wagg sideroad just above Stouffville and they removed the banks with shovels from about one mile of the road before the plow could handle the situation. Mr. Wagg says there was a noticeable lessening of snow where the fence had been put up, but there isn't enough fence. Next winter they hope to have this road blocked off with more snow fence. Sandy Davis is road foreman in the section.
