



Sunday School Lesson

APRIL 6, 1941

CHRIST PROMISES POWER

Golden Text—"But ye shall receive power, after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth."

Acts 1:8

THE LESSON AS A WHOLE

Very appropriately, the series of studies upon which we now enter has been entitled "Christianity Reaches Out." In preparation for the carrying on of the great missionary enterprise, our attention is first directed to our Lord's promise of the coming of the Holy Spirit to empower his servants to preach with conviction and assurance, so that the world might believe that their message was from Heaven. Following the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus Christ, a great change took place, which was not clearly predicted in the Old Testament. Israel nationally, having rejected her Messiah, was set aside by God for the present age. Any who repented and turned to Christ for deliverance found salvation, but not as Jews; rather as poor sinners needing a Saviour. These were, by baptism, separated governmentally from the nation as such, and formed the nucleus of the Church, or assembly of God, a new company, who were to be united to Christ by the Spirit in the present age of grace. Of this the Book of Acts treats in its opening chapters. Then the stream of grace broadens to take in believing Gentiles, and as the wonderful story unfolds, we see Paul, a chosen vessel, and other workers, reaching out to the uttermost parts of the earth.

The Historical Setting

Verse by Verse

Acts 1:1—"The former treatise

of O. Theophilus." He refers to the Gospel of Luke, which was inscribed to "most excellent Theophilus." It is noticeable that the title is no longer used. Possibly some change had taken place in this man's condition, owing to his having boldly confessed Christ. Luke wrote before of "all that Jesus began to do and teach." Note the order here. In the Gospel we have Jesus working on earth. In Acts he is seen working from Heaven (see Mark 16:20).

Verse 2—"He was taken up." Four times our attention is directed to this fact (vs. 9, 11, 22). It was no illusion. Jesus was actually received up into Glory (1 Tim. 3:16). But ere he left this scene he instructed his apostles regarding the work they were to do. They were not left to grope their way.

Verse 3—"Many infallible proofs." Nothing but their positive knowledge that their Lord had appeared among them alive from the dead could account for the assurance with which the followers of Jesus bore witness to his Gospel, and were ready to suffer all manner of shame and torture for his sake. He taught them

to grow wider and deeper until took in all mankind.

Verse 9—"A cloud received him out of their sight." After giving his final command to carry the message everywhere, "he was taken up," and while they looked heavenward cloud—the divine chariot—came down and enveloped him, so that he was lost to sight as he ascended into the Father's House, whence he came.

Verse 10—"Two men stood them." Attempts have been made to identify these men as Moses and Elias, because of the similarity of the expression used when they appeared on the Mount of Transfiguration. But this seems a idle speculation. Angels are spoken of as men, because of the form in which they were manifested (comp. Luke 24:4 with John 20:12). The heavenly visitors came to confirm the testimony of the Lord.

Verse 11—"This same Jesus shall so come ... as ye have seen him go." He shall return in the same way. When we behold him we shall see the very same Jesus whom his disciples knew during those four days after his body had been raised from the dead. Nineteen hundred years in the glory have made change in him. He abides the same yesterday, and today, and forever (Heb. 13:8).

Verse 12—"Then returned th unto Jerusalem." From near Bethany on the Mount of Olivet, where he ascended, his disciples returned to Jerusalem, there to wait in obedience to his command for the fulfillment of the promise regarding the coming and empowerment of the Holy Spirit. Till then they would not be ready begin their great work. But when should come and anoint them, they would be prepared for service.
