

Markham Aces Oust Bolton In Overtime

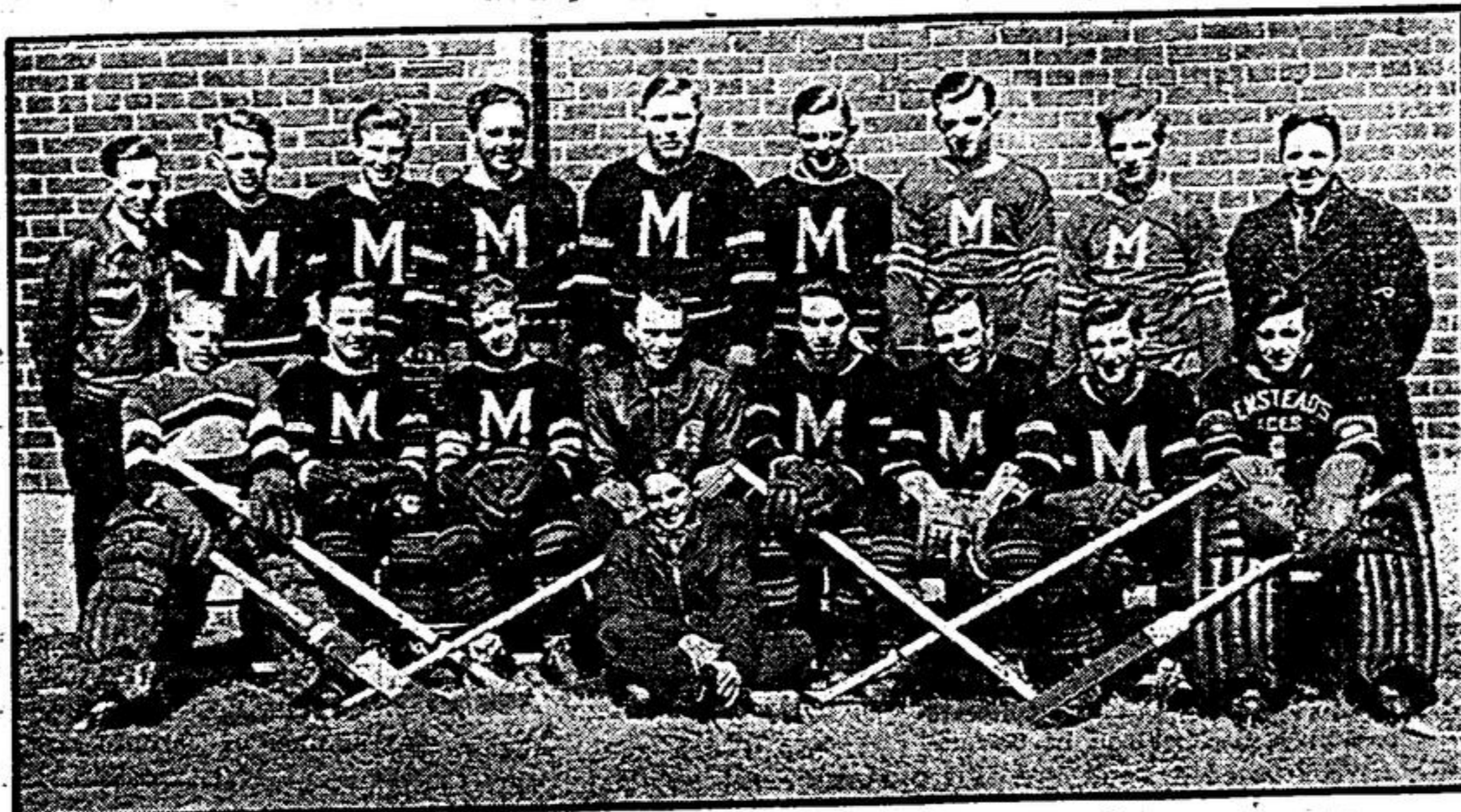
Capture Junior "C" Title With Third Straight Triumph — Overtime Needed to Decide Final Test.

Scoring their third straight victory, Markham Aces captured the Ontario Hockey Association's junior "C" title Friday night at Maple Leaf Gardens by defeating Bolton Flyers 4-2. Markham, however, was forced into ten minutes overtime before overcoming Bolton.

Two goals in the overtime period by Baker and Rowe, brought victory to the Charlie Hempstead team. Both teams battled on even terms for sixty minutes, with Bolton scoring a goal with only three minutes remaining in regulation time to force the game into extra time.

Rowe's overtime goal was his second, while Watson notched the other Markham counter. Bolton's scores were Scarrow from Gibson, and Fisher alone.
