LEAVE POTATO GROWING TO LIGHT SOIL FARMERS

Because hundreds of our farm readers are vitally interested in growing potatoes, we take the liberty of publishing an extract from an article written for the Alliston Herald on this subject. It will be of vital interest to any farmer. Mr. Hisey says: "As the time is drawing near for the farmer to prepare his soil, I would like to suggest a most important essential, be sure your soil is suitable for potato production. I have observed we get the best stock off light loamy soil, that is well fertilized. The potatoes must be clean and bright in appearance to command best prices, to insure quality and heavy production you must plant certified seed, fertilize freely, and give careful attention to the crop during the growing season. If you are not in a position to do this, you better leave the growing of potatoes to the fellow who can."

I would strongly suggest to the farmer who usually plants ten acres to reduce his acreage to five, at least, during the war, giving the smaller acreage better care, using extra acreage for feed. Hogs, cattle, cheese, butter, eggs and poultry, etc, will be in strong demand for export. Potatoes are a local proposition and must be marketed at least within six or seven months after harvested. If this suggestion was followed by the Ontario farmer he would find "it is better to make money off five acres than to lose money on ten."

The growers in New Brunswick during the past two years grew, according to government statistics as much on five acres as Ontario growers did on twelve. P.E.I. as much on five acres as Ontario on ten. Why? Heavy use of fertilizer, more uniform potato soil, certified seed, properly treated, climatic conditions, proper care after planting, strict attention to varieties suitable to their provinces and markets.

Some Ontario farmers rather resent the hold the Eastern Potato shippers have on the Ontario trade. However, they should remember they are Canadians, and also that they reciprocate by buying practically all their manufactured articles from Ontario. The Eastern shippers have a heavy handicap in freights. This season the grower receives about 35c per bag for potatoes, the railway 35c for transportation, the Ontario grower about 50c at the farm.
