John Henry Prentice, 72, veteran farm stock auctioneer, died suddenly Sunday night at his home, 415 Balliol Street, Toronto. Born at Carville, Ont., Mr. Prentice had been a resident of Toronto since 1912. For some years he was general agent for the Massey Harris Company at Unionville and after coming to Toronto continued as a salesman for the company.

For many years he held full sway as a farm stock auctioneer, and was known to have conducted as many as 125 sales in one season in Scarborough, York, Markham area. His nephew Ken Prentice was a partner until last year when he joined the army.

Surviving are his widow, Georgina A. Baker Prentice; four sons, Garfield, Flying Officer J. Henry, Victor F. and Murray L. Prentice, and three daughters, Mrs. S. E. Robinson, Mrs. P. A. Stump and Mrs. Jas. Lea.

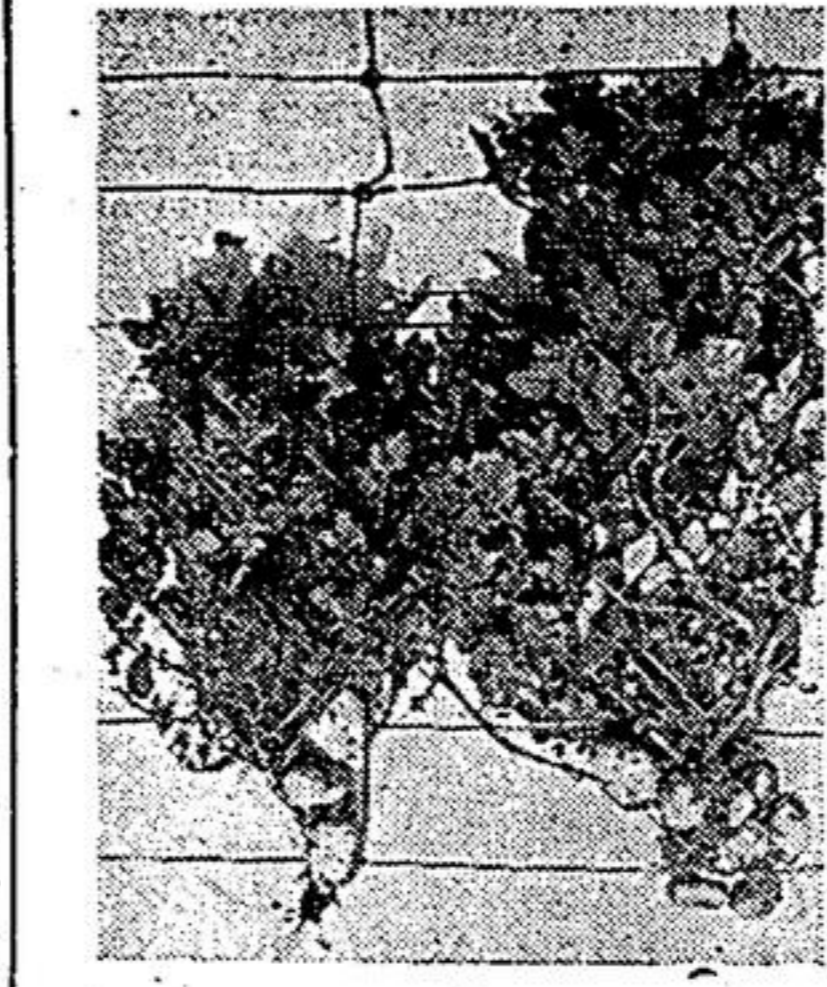
Potato Crop to Benefit by Dept. Research



With plans now being made for the potato crop of 1941, it is timely that we have just received from Agricultural Representative, W. M. Cockburn, Newmarket, a report of the potato growing tests and demonstrations conducted in York County last year by the Ontario Agricultural College and the Dominion Experimental Farm, following up the work carried on by the Agricultural Com. of York County Council during the two previous years.

On each farm, certified seed was planted on manured land, with the demonstration acre receiving 750 lbs. of 4-8-10 fertilizer that was not applied to the half acre check plot. The check plot was sprayed for beetles while the demonstration acre received five sprays of Bordeaux Mixture (Bluestone and Lime), adding poison when necessary. The check plots like most potatoes, went down with Late Blight by the middle of September while the Bordeaux sprayed plots were still green when visited by the group shown in the picture, on October 1st to check up on the results.

At each farm, two rows of each plot were dug by the farmer, one of each being bagged and weighed. On the farm of L. L. Peterson of Ballantrae where the group was photographed, there were five-bags and 50 lbs. on the 40 rod row to the left of the white stake with 11 bags and 55 lbs. on the row of the demonstration plot to the right of the stake. Reeve Wm. Pugsley of Sutton, chairman of the 1940 Agricultural Com. is "holding down" a bag of potatoes, while talking things over with his secretary Jas. Rennie, Reeve of Markham, and in front of them is Agricultural Representative W. M. Cockburn, sitting beside the pile of graded potatoes. Kneeling at the extreme right is Austin Brown of the Dept. of Agriculture, who supervised the entire project in York and Ontario Counties. The proprietor, L. L. Peterson, is holding his dogs by the collar.



Noted Physician Dead, Schooled in Stouffville

Dr. H. C. Wales who received his early education in Stouffville died at his home in Toronto last week. Born in Markham village this well known practitioner lost his mother when a small boy, and was taken with his three other brothers to live in Stouffville by his aunt Mrs. Phillips who lived at the corner of Main street and Baker avenue, later the home of the late Isaac Reaman. One of our present day business men, Frank Rae also Mr. Sam Armstrong were school boys when the four Wales brothers were scholars.

The late Dr. Wales graduated in medicine in 1899 from the University of Toronto. Following graduation he went to England for post-graduate work, then came back to practise at Bracebridge for six years when he moved to Toronto to join the staff of the Sick Children's Hospital. He was chosen president of the Academy of Medicine in 1936.

Surviving are his widow and one son and one daughter.
