C.N.R. Loses Appeal in Storry Case

Before the Appellant Court in Toronto hearing of the appeal of the C.N.R. vs Edgar Storry was dismissed with costs against the company. The appeal was for a new trial on technical grounds.

Arising out of the accident in which Mr. Storry lost his right arm at the elbow, two cases were heard. At the second trial Mr. Storry was awarded \$5,750 and costs, said to run between two and three thousand dollars for Mr. Storey alone.

The final appeal before Chief Justices Robinson, McMasten, and Gillanders, all three were unanimous in their decision for dismissal.
