Free Trees Given Rural Schools

Markham Received Over \$5,000 and Whitchurch 4,000

A total of 56,000 trees were distributed to school children of York county rural areas last Friday, for planting on their farms. In Whitchurch Clerk J. Crawford distributed 4,000 and in Markham Clerk Hoover took out over 5,000.

Distribution of the trees was the result of negotiations over the past two months between the county reforestation committee and the provincial department of lands and forests, and was made to enlist the services of the rural school children of the area in the province's tree planting program, which was threatened to be held up because of shortage of labor.

Similar schemes are being adopted in several other counties in the province. Reeve James Rennie, secretary of the reforestation committee of the county, was enthusiastic over the plan, and felt that in addition to ensuring that the trees would not be wasted, it was giving important training to the children of the county.

"It is a fine thing to give children the idea of planting trees," he remarked, and we heartily agree with Mr. Rennie.

The young trees were brought by truck from the Midhurst forest station to Newmarket, and from there taken to the various schools by truck or car. From 100 to 250 were allowed each school, according to the size of the school, and from six to ten given each child. Complete instructions on their planting and care were given by the department to the teachers, who in turn instructed the children.

NOTICE is hereby given that all residents of Stouffville are required to forthwith clean their cellars, drains, yards, pig styes, water closets, out-buildings and remove therefrom all dirt, manure, and any other substance which may endanger the public health and have the same completed by the 15th day of May next on which day the Sanitary Inspector will commence a general inspection and furthermore take notice that the section of the Public Health Act prohibiting the keeping of hogs excepting in pens at least 100 feet away from any dwelling house and lane and street with floors kept clean from all standing water and regularly cleansed, will be strictly enforced.

All citizens are requested to keep their property constantly clean and thoroughly disinfected.

The Department also reserves the right to demand from any successful tenderer a security deposit, in the form of a certified cheque or bond as above, equal to 10 per cent of the amount of his bid, to guarantee the proper fulfilment of the contract.
