Contrary to what has been stated in other nations, Canada has only interned 870 men, and about 10 women since the war began according to information disclosed Ottawa. These internments were made under the Defence of Canada Regulations and these men were placed in two camps, with other provision being made for the women During the first World War, Canada quite "puffed up" to know someone had 24 internment camps and of the 8,579 male prisoners, 7,758 arrested in this country and were sent here from other sections of the British Empire.
