The common goldfish, which is the first stage from the carp. The gold fantail, the common goldfish bred with a fancy fantail. The Comet, a long thin goldfish that moves more quickly than the average. The shubunkins, which is the goldfish speckled with red-white and blue and which Mr. Aston called the Coronation fish the year of the Coronation and sold millions of them to England. The black telescope Moors is an all-black goldfish with terrific popeyes and the Calico Fantail is a goldfish with a fantail bred from one of the red-and-white-and blues, so it's apt. to come out most anything.

In inter-breeding goldfish some queer ones are obtained, slamese goldfish or two grown together, or two fish with only one head. These aren't destroyed but are used to breed other goldfish to get other odd shapes.  
The longest goldfish Mr. Aston has ever seen was one 2 feet long. It lived in Indiana. The largest he has ever grown was 12 1/2 inches long, or over one foot. It's the bunk about a goldfish growing just as big as a pool or goldfish bowl will let it. Mr. Aston says the size of the goldfish depends on whether it was in the first batch of eggs the maw-fish laid, the second batch or the third. The first batch of eggs is the one that will turn out to be big super-doooper goldfish.

As for age, a good-living goldfish will survive 10 years easily and some have lived to be 20 years old.

The baby goldfish are fed boiled yolk of egg wrapped in cotton sacks. They suck at the cotton to get the egg yolk out. The grown-up goldfish are fed a dish of wheat flour, with ground flies and fleas as a treat. I tried to catch a flea to bring back to Toronto but the flea said nothing doing.

Mr. Aston has never been asked for goldfish for anyone to swallow alive, as was a favourite in the U.S. a couple of years ago. But he has eaten cooked goldfish himself, as an experiment. The hatchery own a cat named George. George never touches the goldfish when they are alive but will sit in the edge of a tank and howl when a goldfish dies, because the cat knows it can have that dead goldfish to eat."

## Mrs. Oliver Forsyth Buried on May 24

The death of Mrs. Oliver Forsyth in her 74th year on May 22, ended an illness of five years of suffering and steady decline, and therefore must have come as a welcome respite to one who had suffered so long.

Being born on the Cecil Brown farm just east of Stouffville Mrs. Forsyth spent all her days in this neighborhood. She was the daughter of Philip Brown and his wife Jane (Madill), and is the last of five children of this family. The old Brown home so long established and still in the family name gave the locality the name of "Brown's Corners," in the early days, something that seems to have died out of recent years however. Mrs. Forsyth's last surviving sister Allie Brown passed away seven years ago. She had lived in the east-end of Stouffville for years.

As a young maiden the subject of this sketch Mereda Brown united in marriage with Oliver Forsyth who later became the liveryman whose business was well known over the countryside in days when horse and buggy travel was very popular. 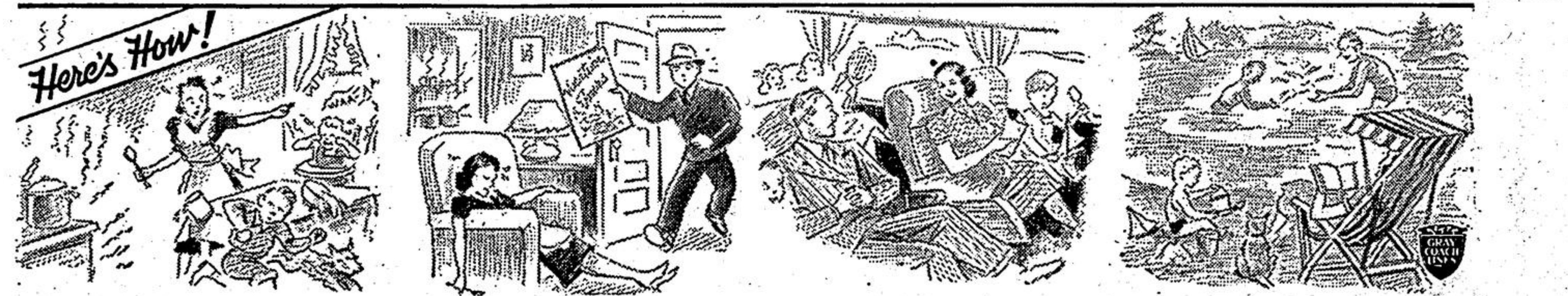
