OPEN LETTER TO REEVE AND COUNCIL OF PICKERING

Green River

Dear Sir:

I have been reading a good deal about the village of Pickering finding it difficult to give fire protection to the township area in the south, and we understand there have been advances made to induce the Pickering Township council to contribute to the cost of a new engine.

Now I think it should be remembered that the village outfit is merely a chemical wagon, and its usefulness is very limited. Arriving at a fire before it gets underway, the blaze might be subdued, but it is not fitted to fight a blaze once spread around.

Also, if the ratepayers down at the south wish to have this protection, then the council should set up a fire area, and that district could be assessed expressly for any cost incurred in this behalf. This is being done in numerous places we recall, and might be the best solution in Pickering, unless the whole township can share equally in fire protection, the north from Claremont and Stouffville, and the south from Pickering. However, it must be kept in mind that a mere chemical wagon is very little value in the country. What is needed is a hose outfit and an engine to force water from a well or creek.
