## SUDDEN DEATH OF THOS. MANTLE

Two brothers are Albert (Mantle, Claremont; Frank Mantle, London, also one sister Mrs. Broughton, of Dutton.

## HOG WEIGHING SCALE AVAILABLE TO FARMERS

Realizing the importance of live hog weights in relation to carcass value and quality, Production Service Dominion Department of Agriculture has arranged to make available a specially designed scale for weighing pigs under farm conditions. The scale, with lifting device which is an essential part of the apparatus, may be obtained at cost price and should prove valuable to farmers who require suitable hog weighing equipment on application to W. S. McMullen, 59 Victoria st., Toronto, live stock fieldman for Ontario.

The scale is a modified steel yard, with a beam length of 53 inches and together with the lifting device has a total weight of 42 pounds. The weighing capacity is 250 pounds net, with divisions of two pounds, and, provided the crate in which the pig is placed does not weigh more than 125 pounds, the scale will operate as designed. Specifications have been drawn up for the building of the crate which, if built to design, will not be heavier than approximately 60 pounds. The crate is suspended from the scale by a wire cable which is passed under the bottom of the crate near each end and fastened loosely at the top. Other forms of crate construction may be used and different means of suspension employed, but crates made to specifications have been tested and have proven satisfactory.

There are no weights which may become detached. The scale may be readily moved as required and placed in operation provided strong suspension is available and a distance between floor and ceiling of at least seven feet. Each scale will be government inspected before leaving the factory.

Live stock fieldmen of the Production Service, Dominion Department of Agriculture are located in each province.

## PROFESSION LOSES CLEVER NURSE IN DEATH OF MISS JEAN GUNN, O.B.E.

With fellow-workers of the nursing and medical profession, and hundreds of friends from all walks of life attended the funeral service of Miss Jean L. Gunn, O.B.E., LL.D., was held in Old St. Andrew's United Church Toronto, on Tuesday. Miss Gunn had been superintendent of the Nursing School, and a member of the staff of Toronto General Hospital for the past 28 years. She died Saturday after a long illness. Nurse Gunn was a sister to Mr. George Gunn, Church street, Stouffville.

The body was taken to Belleville, her birthplace, for burial.
