DESTROY Weeds

These Noxious

Sow Thistles—Ox-eye Daisy—Wild Mustard—Bind Weed—Blue Weed—Pepper Grasses—Bladder Campion—Hawkweeds—Stinkweeds—Canada Thistle—Common Milkweed—White Cockle—Wild Carrot—Wild Lettuce—Common Ragweed—Dodder—Common Burdock—Poison Ivy—Chicory—Docks—Russian Thistle—Tumbling Mustard—Cinquefoils—Spurges.

The Weed Control Act States

Clause 5—Every occupant of land, or if the land is unoccupied, the owner shall destroy all weeds designated noxious by the regulations as often in every year as is sufficient to prevent the ripening of their seeds.

Clause 23—Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of this Act or refuses or neglects to obey any lawful order of an Inspector given under authority of this Act, shall incur a penalty of not less than \$10 nor more than \$50 for every such offence.

Weeds NOT CUT by JULY 10 will be destroyed by Order of the Inspector and costs charged to occupant of the land and if not paid will be charged against the property.
