Sunday Gasoline Sales Forbidden

"Gasless" Sundays is not the correct name to give the Sabbath day from this out just because there is to be no gasoline sold. By an order issued from Ottawa this week, all gasoline stations must now close at 7 o'clock Saturday evenings and remain closed until 7 on Monday mornings. However, it is still legal to burn all the gas you want, (but not patriotic,) and the controller is careful to explain that it is really O.K. to carry an extra can in your car. Hence, it will not be "gasless" Sunday by any means.

The Controller calls upon all Canadians to view the thing from a patriotic stand, and suggests that only necessary driving be done. If his patriotic plea fails to be heard, more stringent steps will be taken, he declares.

If gasoline really needs to be conserved for our war effort, then many are surprised that a more harsh policy was not set out. Few people would want to be burning up gasoline that is needed for bombing Germany or for driving trucks, transports and the scores of other services needing the fuel, yet, with only a partial effort to impress that on the people, it may be accepted in half-hearted way we fear. However, an out-and-out "gasless" Sunday might work great hardship too.

Anyway, next Saturday those who want to drive on Sunday had better fill up on Saturday afternoon. Service station tanks must be shut at 7 o'clock if the order can be gazetted in time to be made effective this week.

Garages may remain open on Sunday to render services on cars, but must not have gasoline for sale.

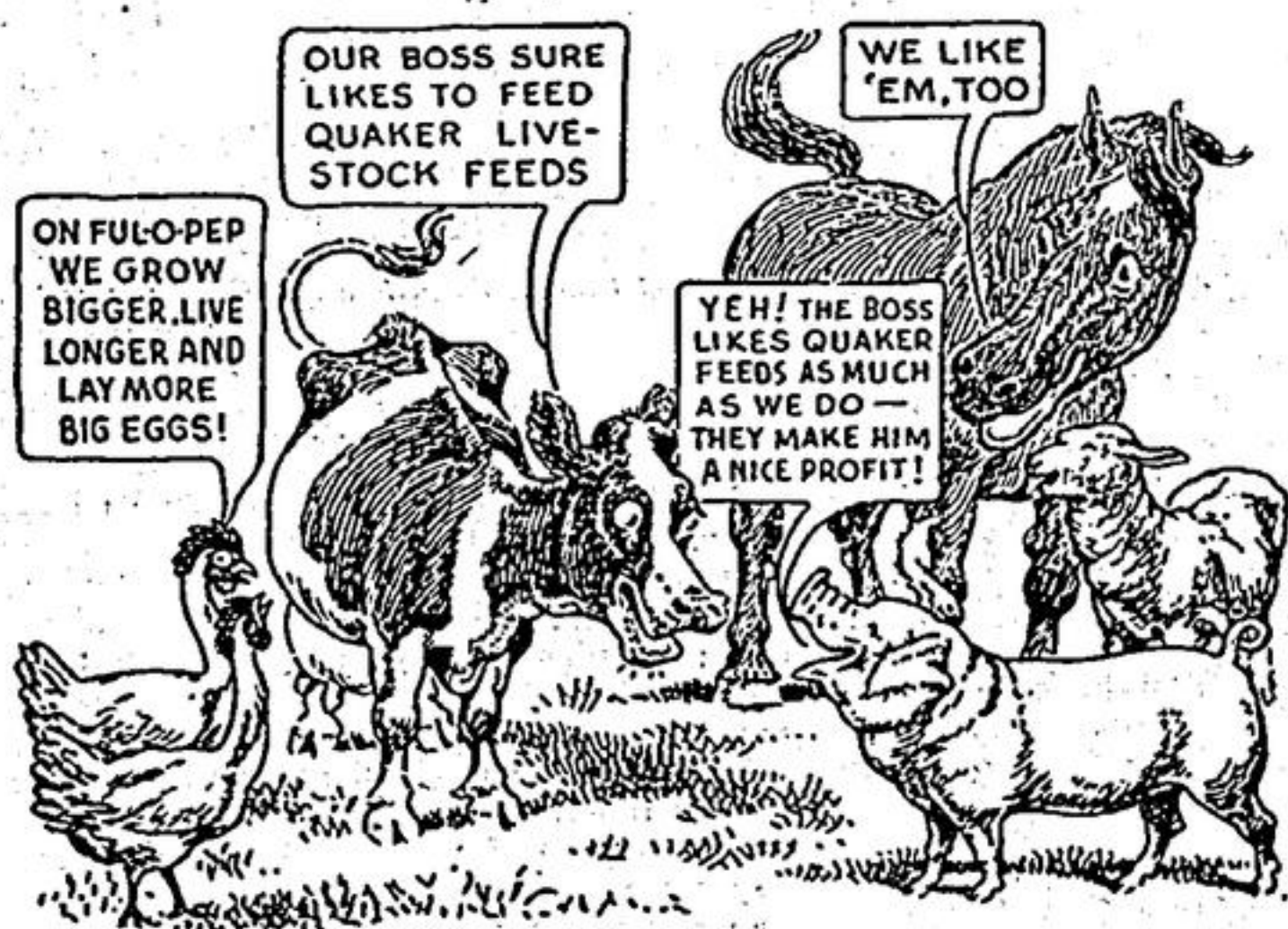
