ALSIKE OUTLOOK NOT LIKE LAST WAR

John Robb, Markham farmer, threshed 15 acres of alsike last week which turned out 60 bushels of seed, or four bushels to the acre. This was considered a record yield. Yields of only 2 bushels to the acre are reported by Allan Meyer, Reg. Rennie, Jack Spang, and others on these good farms.

For the most part the yield is around 2 and 2½ bushels to the acre, but in some parts of the province it is much better than that. The prices is very low this year, and while the market has scarcely opened up, we are informed by a local dealer that it will be around \$7 to \$11 per bushel.

During the last war with a market in Britain, Belgium and France open to us, prices soared to record peaks, but these markets are now closed to us, and local demand is not great.
