Lake to See New Dance Pavilion

A new dance pavilion is in the offing for Musselman's Lake, and will be erected on the south side, on the site of the first of such buildings to be put up there. Fred Coultice is the owner and operator of the present stand and will also run the new stand, lumber for which is already on the site.

The present hall was built nearly thirty years ago, and was originally operated by Edw. Baker of Stouffville in conjunction with a large boarding house which was burned to the ground several years ago. For years this clump of cedars on the lake was the favorite site for picnics, large and small, from miles around.

The new building will be of frame construction, and over 100 feet long. The hardwood floor to be laid is now in readiness, but Mr. Coultice does not expect to begin his project till fall.
