# Newmarket Sports Writer Quotes Local Tobacconist as Leading Baseball Authority in York County

"Shine" Davis, Former Empire Recalls Players of Yesteryears

"Shine" Davis of Stouffville, who for years was the leading hardball umpire in York county and one of the best outside the big leagues we've ever seen, bemoans the passing of hardball at Aurora and Stouffville. "I don't know what the young fellows are thinking about these days. Time was when every four corners pretty near had a baseball team," he told us a couple of weeks ago when we had the chance of a gabfest with "Shiner" in his pressing and cleaning establishment.

We told him of the league percolating nicely in Newmarket this season and last and when we mentioned Herb Cain, "Shine" said, "Why he was one of the best ball-players ever to play in these parts." We informed him Herb was pretty nearly as good as ever and then asked him of the hundreds of ball-players he'd seen at Willowdale, Stouffville, Uxbridge, Richmond Hill, Aurora, Newmarket, Sutton and other places to pick the best.

Dooley Butler, the Aurora catcher, was the first he named. "He was about the smartest player and hardest hitter to perform in these parts. He had great team spirit and fight. McDonald of Beaverton was another lad who really had the goods. 'Lefty' Lennox of Stouffville and Harold 'Doc' Leary of Sutton are the best of the pitchers. A lot of people pick Earl Cook as the best. He's gone the farthest, the only one to make pro, but it's only because he got the breaks. Stouffville lost the title once when Lennox got injured. Doc Leary was the coolest and craftiest."

He rolled off a list of stellar

performers, including Bas. McHale, Hec. Gordon, Ken Blanchard, Jack Marks of Uxbridge, Junkin of Sunderland, Harold Bruels and others we had almost forgotten. If you were running a hardball club how would you like an infield composed of 'Gene' Underhill at first, Arnold Molyneux at second, Red Forsythe of Stouffville at third and Jack Crosler at short? In their prime you couldn't beat them. That's Shine's infield, with Brown of Willowdale, Doc. McHale, Lindsay Robinson, Wes Bowdway and other also ranking pretty high. The outfield had Herb. Cain in right, Bob Crosby of Uxbridge in centre and Slugger Storey of Stouffville in left. We never saw Storey in action but Shine says he was very fast and a powerhouse batter. Roy Gifford and Prosser were others he liked.

We didn't argue with the Shiner. As a matter of fact, we couldn't, for nobody knows hardball any better than he does. We never were able to best him in any argument when we tried on the diamond and we don't remember any others that did either. He knew the rules from A to Z, was totally impartial in his decisions, always on top of the play, and gentlemanly about it all too. More than that he had the confidence of players on both sides. If he made a mistake we all knew it was an honest one. A veteran of the last war and a clean-living fellow, the genial Shiner would like to get back in the fray, but, as he says about ballplayers, "It is best to know when you've had enough and passed your best." Old soldiers and umpires, we guess, "never die."
