William and Harry Hunt are spending a few holidays in Markham with Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Tidsbury.

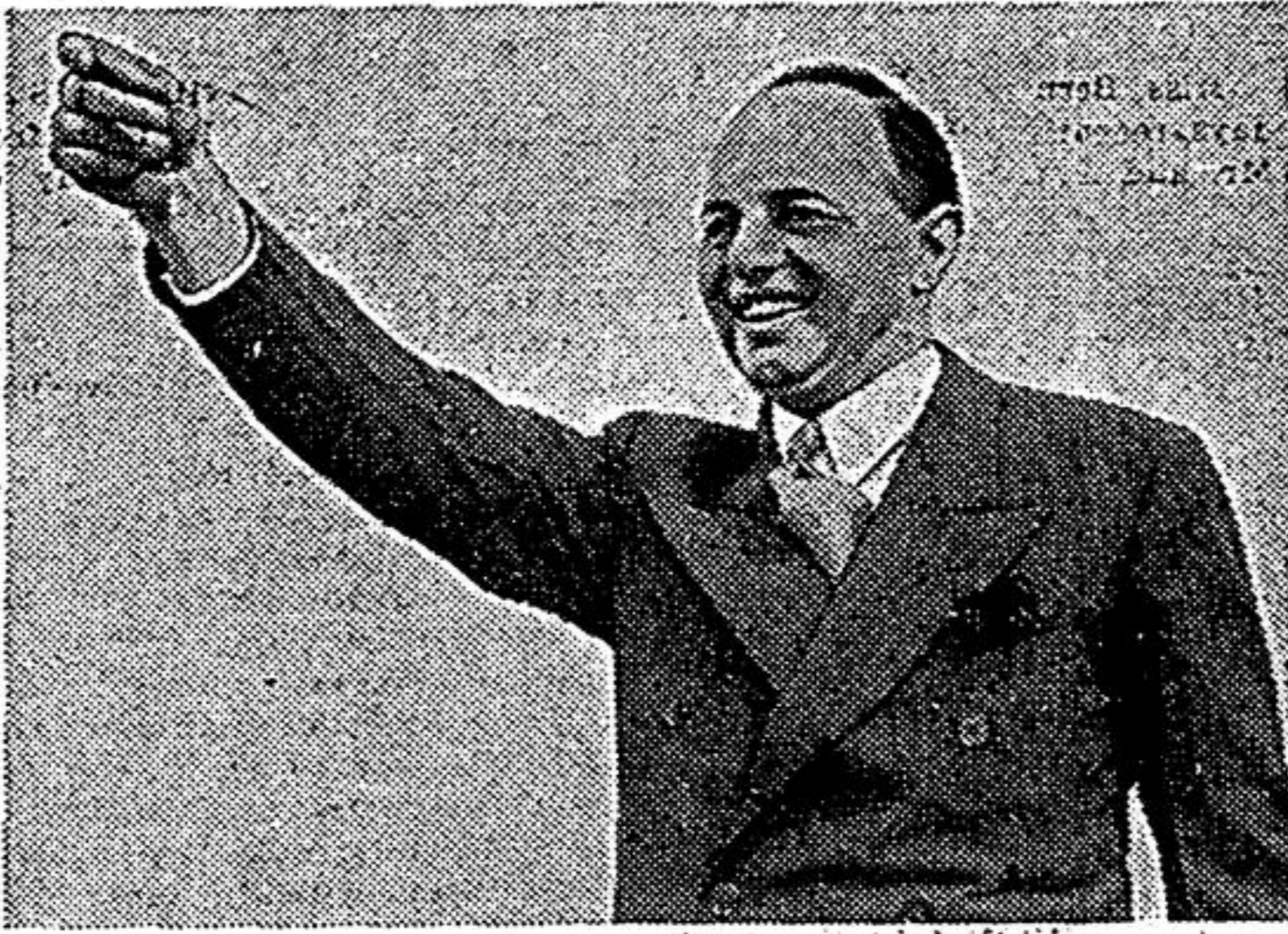
Mr. and Mrs. Fred Yake were Sunday visitors with Mr. and Mrs. Wellington Yake.
