COUNCIL TO REGULATE CLAREMONT SPEED LIMIT

A bylaw was given its three readings and passed at the regular session of Pickering Council on Tuesday afternoon, fixing the speed limit for the Village of Claremont at 30 miles per hour. The ban on fast driving extends over both the 9th concession and the Brock Road, where these roads are within the boundaries of the village. Owing to numerous complaints, several accidents, and several near accidents, it has been deemed necessary to take steps to restrict traffic and notice will be posted to this effect. Fines for a breach of the new law may vary from \$5 to \$10 and license suspended.
