(Continued from page 1) The little ones, saying they had children too at home. Women and children were drawn up first and were out of sight before we got on deck, explained Mr. Hall.

It was long and anxious as we did not know where the women were. Finally we took courage and asked about them, and were told by the Germans they were on a lower deck. We were finally granted privilege of seeing them.

We were later transferred to the Dresden when we were permitted to be with our families, hold services again and altogether we were treated kindly by the Germans. We spent 33 days on this boat, long weary ones, not knowing where we might land.

"Through it all we had great reason to thank God for the covenants given us in the sky," said the speaker. "As after the great deluge on the earth God caused the bow in the sky, (the rainbow), saying it shall not happen again to you."

"After we once landed," Capt. Yader said, "men this is our lucky day, we have gone through British blockades, dodged submarines, escaped firing from airplanes." Some said, "Yes Captain, that is true, but if God had not helped us we would not be here today," and he acknowledged the fact.
