Signs were ordered and Road Supt. Maxwell said he would have them put up.

Mr. D. Pickering, Victoria Square, will be allowed to complete the construction of a garage on his premises with certain changes to make it more closely comply with the building bylaw of the township. The addition to be built will be 30x42, and Building Inspector Craig discovered the material had been ordered, but did not comply with the stipulations of the bylaw.

Council heard a notice read to the effect that hospitalization rates at the Brierbush, Stouffville, would be advanced from \$1.25 to \$1.40 per day. It was pointed out that this hospital does not receive the 60c per diem obtained by public owned institutions doing a similar work.

A reminder that if county taxes are paid before Dec. 15 a liberal discount may be obtained. The total county tax for Markham Twp., runs into the sum of \$6,700 odd dollars.

North York radial railway continues to reap profits, showing \$11,188 for the eight months of this year, and \$4,812 for the month of August alone.

Markham Agricultural Society was granted \$100 for the fair, East York Plowing match \$15, and North York match \$10.

Every member of council took a hand in criticizing the townline expenditures at Gormley, from the 4th concession to Yonge street, as an account from Whitechurch for two years was read, totalling over \$600 for Markham's half. Councillor Clark urged council to pay the 1940 account of \$400 on the basis of \$300, an amount he said was agreed on to be spent last year.

Councillor Barber said, "the items for snow plowing were O.K., but work said to be done by grader does not even make sense."

The road in question through Gormley is one of the very heavy travelled sections of the district, and despite the money spent is still a very poor highway to travel on, especially from the third to the fourth.

Mutton-eating dogs have been ravaging the sheep folds of H. Mackie, Harry White and B. Watford at Headford. These farmers were awarded \$13, \$12 and \$70 respectively for loss to their flocks, as caused by dogs on or about Sept. 25. Motion moved by Councillors Barber and Reesor.

In addition to a number of smaller road accounts the grader operator was paid \$78 for services during Sept., while Hoover & Roberts were paid \$1,926.60 for 1482 yards of gravel in the township. Relief paid amounted to \$213.36; part of which was a carry-over from August.
